

Hills construction firm gets Army reserve bid

A Farmington Hills construction firm has received a \$2 million contract from the Army Corps of Engineers for expansion and modification of the Inkster Army Reserve Center.

Pyramid Construction Co. is expected to start work immediately. The center is expected to be ready for occupation by its new tenants, the headquar-

ters and two subordinate units of 300th Military Police Command, by September 1980.

The headquarters, along with its subordinate 301st Military Police Prisoner of War Camp and 424th Personnel Services Co., is currently at the Livonia Reserve Center on Schoolcraft.

The move to Inkster is intended to

relieve overcrowding at the Livonia Center and give the 300th, headquarters of a five state command, its own building.

The Inkster Center was formerly the home of a Reserve medical unit which moved to Southfield.

The 300th comprises 25 units and some 1,300 part time soldiers in 13 cities of Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri and Iowa. The units wartime missions would include operation of prisoner of war camps as well as other military police functions.

Reservists hold down full time civilian jobs maintaining their military skills by attending two days of drill per month (usually one weekend) and two weeks of annual training each year.

John W. Ennest, of Farmington, has been appointed to participate in the President's Executive Interchange Program in Washington D.C. He is a vice president and assistant comptroller for National Bank of Detroit.

During his 12-month assignment, Ennest will report to the assistant secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture who is responsible for rural development.

The interchange program was established in 1969 by Lyndon B. Johnson to provide mid-level executives in industry and government with an opportunity to learn about the operation and decision making process of the opposite sector.
