District Employs Pollsters To Get Sex Ed Opinions

The opinions of the community could be the determining factor in Farmington School District's landling of sex education, substance abuse and minority group understanding.

The Farmington Bard of Education Monday night at its regular meeting authorized the hiring of a professional research organization to conduct an opinion survey in Farmington on the three sensitive areas. The board authorized \$500 for the poll.

Suggestion for the poll came from the Family
life Education committee, (FLE) a school board
appointed group. The committee was established
primarily to advise the board on sex education.

TRUSTEE GARY LICHTMAN said the FLE recommended the opinion poll to "find the feeling or pulse of the Farmington community" regarding sex education, drug abuse and minority group under-

education, orug anuse and innoving general standing.

Robert Deadman, city police chief and a member of the FLE, wrote in a letter to the district, the poll 'will be used as a tool to establish guidelines that coilcide with majority opinions."

The board unanimously approved the survey after answering questions concerning the validity of a poll.

"If we are going to take a poll, we ought to take the best one (we can," its said. He said the delicate nature of the subject might make it "very difficult to poll and get an accurate sampling of the community." . . .

THE RESULTS of such a survey, he continued, should be "above reproach" because of the highly emotional subjects.

"The worst thing we can do is come up with a poll which can be subject to question because of the size of the sample," he said.

Lichtman said district facilities could be used to gut the cost of the survey. However, most of the work should be done by a professional organization instead of district personnel, he said.

"We're dealing with a highly scientific area when we're talking about opinion polls." Lichtman said.
