Farmington Community Center moves into its first official holiday season a-buzz with activities. During a recent week, Photographer Fran Evert caught many phases of the goings-on.


Classes in art, ballet, bridge, Christmas crafts and sewing have been held there. Frequent meetings, luncheons, teas, and exhibits are scheduled as well.


"We are tremendously pleased with the response of the community and are anxious to hear Farmington's ideas about how to serve it better," said Mrs. Taylor.
