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GOOD ROADS—THE EARS OF NATIONS.

As I write there before me two strangely different articles—one is a map of Europe and the other a copy of Max Mueller's lectures on Languages. The map of Europe shows about thirty different States—peopled by populations that are either hostile or suspicious of one another. Their governmental systems are different; their industries are different; their houses, habits and garments are different—their speech is all but unintelligible to each other. There are barriers of forts on every border. Statesmanship consists in safeguarding the territory of each separate people persisting in aggression and planning for conquest.

Each people soon acquired the notion that they alone had all the virtues and excellences—to them alone was given the high prerogative from Heaven itself—to rule the earth. The stranger was the enemy.

In this feeling and with this force of tradition and this conception of rightful interests these separate provinces, kingdoms, empires are upon the soul of Europe. Whence then the great and almost impassible gulf—whence then the rancor, the rage, the enmity, that seeks to hate one another from the face of the world?

This arose in their isolation; they were separated by mountains ranges; uncrossable rivers; uncharted seas; there were no good roads to make easy communication a reality! In their separateness they each one developed peculiarities—a seeming distinct individualism—till all resemblances were seemingly lost.

Good roads alone would have prevented the arising of a continent—yea a world—of states, discordant, belligerent, drenched with fraternal blood. The peoples at a distance lost touch—lost interests that had been common—lost sympathy, lost regard and respect—and lo! the World War!

One hundred years ago—just at the dawn of the new era of rapid communication—Massachusetts was larger, measured in time and effort needed to reach its every corner, was larger than is the entire United States today. The City of Washington, our nation's capital, was located as it is because it was "mid-way" in the Nation. Now it is on the rim, geographically, but the telegraph, telephone, telerailroad, airplane, set it exactly in the center of our Nation—and perhaps of the world.

Watts, Stevenson, Fulton, Morse, Bell, Marconi—these men have built the real roads—and Nations walk the streets of the Empire they have builded. This work of the inventors has given real unity to National life. Means of safe and rapid communication are the corner-stones, the foundation rocks of the House of the Nation.
