FRUIT GROWERS' ASS'N.

The Grand Junction Fruit Growers' Association of Oregon may be cited as a good example of the work the co-operation of fruit-growers have accomplished. This is the oldest and largest of about thirty organizations of that state. It has been organized for more than 15 years. The amount of its total business in 1906 was \$14,278, an increase of nearly a 1000 per cent in a decade. For three years, 1904-06 the average number of cars shipped annually was more than 1000. The fruit consisted of peaches, apples, pears, plums, grapes and apricots. These went in carloads to 26 different states. In addition to shipping fruit the association buys for its members many supplies and articles of various kinds.

The benefits have been many. After deducting a commission to cover the expense of marketing and generally of packing, the fruit associations have been able, as a rule, to return their members more than these had formerly received and more than other person not selling through the association have received.

The California Fruit Growers' Association Exchange finds it profitable to keep about 75 agents at various centers of the U. S., Canada and one in London.

One of the most marked advantages is in connection with the grading and packing of fruit.

Another potent factor is in respect to railroad rates. Shipping as conducted in carload lots saves a great deal of money, as special rates are given to associations.

Chevrolet Cuts On All 4-90 Models

Chevrolet Cuts On 4-90 Models

Makes Reductions Varying From \$160 to \$180.

FORMER REBATE HOLDS.

Reductions in prices on "4-90" models of Chevrolet automobiles is announced today, becoming effective on this date. The drop in prices varies from \$160 to \$180 on the various models made by the company.

Under the new price scale the Chevrolet "Four Ninety" touring car is reduced \$175; the roadster \$160; the sedan \$180; coupe \$170 and light delivery wagon \$175.

These prices, the company states are for the fully-equipped "Four Ninety" in each case.

This is the second price concession to be made by the Chevrolet company. During the week of the Detroit automobile show, the company announced a plan whereby a rebate of \$70 on every car would be made later in the season, provided sales reached a total of 50,000 cars between January 1 and August 1 of this year.

Barney Habel of the Chevrolet Sales and Service company of Pontiac, declared this forenoon that he was informed by the company the guaranteed rebate of \$70 on each car, provided a total sale of 50,000 cars was reached, as announced some time ago, would not be affected by the new prices. The rebate, he said, will be paid on all the sales made in the prescribed period, up to May 1, and are collectable at any time instead of waiting until August 1st.

The new prices are thus made \$645 for the touring car, \$638 for the roadster, \$1,155 for the coupe and \$1,195 for the sedan.
