Detroit Veterans Asked Views On War Memorial

Ex-Service Men to Get Square Deal.

HOW ABOUT IT?

Letters have been sent by Mayor James Couzens to various war veteran organizations of Detroit, requesting them to send to his office one official representative each for a conference to be held at 2:30 p. m. Thursday, June 9th, on the question of a war memorial for the city.

"In keeping with the desire expressed by various service organizations, I wish to call a conference of veterans to be held in the mayor's office at 2:30 p. m., June 9th, for the purpose of determining the final views of the service men on the question of a soldiers' memorial for the city of Detroit.

"Each Detroit war veteran organization that has been formally organized to date with a membership of at least 50 Detroit citizens, is invited to choose, in its own way, one delegate to this conference.

"It is suggested that each delegate so chosen, come prepared to state the number of bona fide members in the body he represents. The writer will endeavor to select, as delegates also, a number of veterans, not to exceed five, as representatives of former service men and women of the smaller organizations or of no organizations at all.

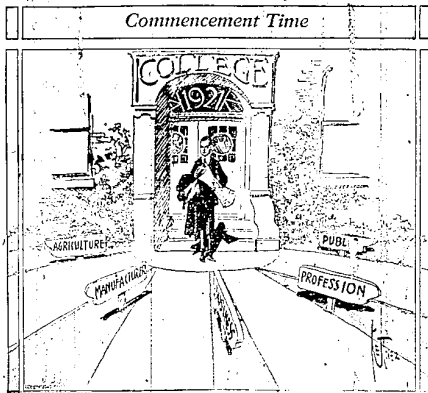

Personal Letter Describes Recent Race Riot

T. D. Irving Writes to His Parents in Farmington.

Tulsa, Okla., June 2, 1921.

Dear Father and Mother:—

Have you got a minute yet to write me a line. We have just had one of the worst race riots here that ever was in the history of the U. S. About 130 negroes and nine whites were killed and 200 or more wounded.

I will mail you a copy of the paper so you can read all about it. We got thru without any trouble and are alright. The worse fighting was only about two blocks from our home just over the big hill which protected us from the rifle fire.

Believe me, we did not sleep night before last. We thought we were on the French front by the noise.

The papers state that there were only nine white people killed but we know there were many more.

The paper also states sixty-eight negroes killed but conservative estimates are 150. No one will ever know because the whole negro section (Little Africa) was burned down and many bodies lost.

It has been a terrible thing to happen but it seemed as if it could not be stopped. The negroes started it by parading thru the streets in the white district armed with high-powered rifles and intimidating the whites until something had to be done.

When it was once started, nothing could stop it and the whites never quit until negro towns about 10,000 people, was cleaned out and burned.

I never heard so much shooting in my life and never saw such a fire. A section 12 blocks wide and 12 miles long was burned in one night and a day. The National Guard is here now and everything is quiet.

No business yet but we are both well.

Bonus Delayed By Senate

Senate Urged to Act on Proposed Amendments.

VETERANS ASK FOR SPEED.

Different organizations have been urging the senate to speed action on the soldiers' bonus bill but this has had little effect Monday night, the senate finance committee delayed its meeting until tomorrow.

Prospects are that the bill will be reported to the senate Tuesday afternoon and come to a vote Wednesday.

The message from the veterans urged the senate to prevent any action that would delay passage of the bill or payment of the bonuses, asking that the senators go over the top in the same manner that the men had done in Flanders.

The house still insists upon its amendments and the leaders of that body contend that the embodiment of these changes in the final bill will not delay payment of the bonuses, since \$10,000,000 of 30 year bonds could still be sold immediately and the money used for paying bonuses while other bonds are being printed and sold.
