"In keeping with the desire ex-pressed by various service organ-izations, I wish to call a confer-ence of veterans to be held in the mayor's office at 2:30 p. m. June 9th., for the purpose of defermin-ing the final views of the service memorial for the city of Defroit. "Each Detroit war veteran or-ganization that has been formally organized to date with a member;

organized to date with a member-ship of at least 50 Detroit citizens, is invited to choose, in its own way, one delegate to this confer-

"It is suggested that each dele-"It is suggested that each dele-gate so chosen, come prepared to state the number of bona fide members in the body he represents. The writer will endeavor to select, as delegates also, a number of veterans, not to exceed five, as representatives of former service men and women of the smaller or-centrations or of no orealizations ganizations or of no organizations at all.
