Ebenhaus, a civil engineer with a technical education and with eight years of practical work behind him. Every detail of the large jobs are given close supervision by MacDonachie and Ebenhaus. Henry Ford To Build Huge Plant In Near Future

Northville Will Soon be Scene of Great Activity

ONE THOUSAND MEN TO BE EMPLOYED

Few small towns in the United States are as fortunate as Northville because of the fact that Henry Ford the World's greatest capitalist has chosen this village as an integral part of his manufacturing plans. Sentiment undoubtedly had a great deal to do with Mr. Ford's decision, on the other hand Northville has the requirements for his manufacturing needs. Both as to location and as

to availability. Water power is to be developed and a large plant employing over a thousand men is to be erected. The advantage in having a Ford unit simply means that Northville will become a live, hustling, busy and prosperous city. For the reason that Ford products have an unlimited market; because unlimited capital is available and because Henry Ford manufactures a necessary article which he sells at a profit.

There is no doubt that Farmington and Northville, situated as they are on the D. U. R. and being connected by a monumental cement road, will grow toward each other.

On a recent tour of inspection to Northville, Mr. Ford met Carl R. Ely, Northville business man and councilman. Mr. Ford asked "What does the Northville council intend to do about the sewer project?" Mr. Ely answered, "We met last night and instructed the village attorney, Mr. C. C. Yerkes, to get in touch with you. As quick as you get the sewer proposition and answer it we will start work on it. We want your plant here and we want to co-operate with you." Mr. Ford then said, "We are going to put a thousand men on the job as soon as sewer facilities are provided."

An addition of steel and sash is being constructed at present for a welding plant. The present plant employs 275 men and makes valves for all the Ford cars and tractors. The present capacity is 70,000 valves a day.
