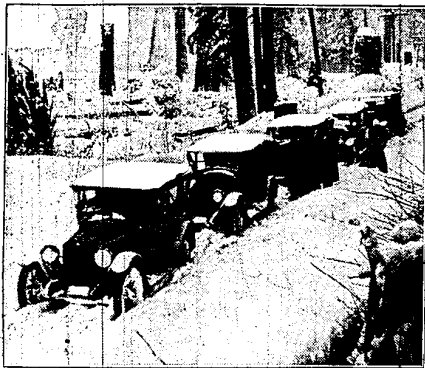

STETHOSCOPE TO LOCATE TROUBLE

Simple and Convenient Contrivance Can Be Put Together to Find Knock of Engine.

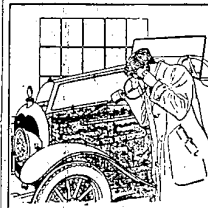
OPERATION OF DEVICE EASY

Use of Instrument Will Warn Car Owner of Approaching Disturbance, and Will Save Much Money in Making Repairs.

A powerful stethoscope for locating knocks in machinery can be made at small expense. It consists of a cylindrical chamber about four inches in diameter and four inches long, to one end of which is attached a long rod to touch the machine being tested. From the other end are run two rubber tubes, one to each ear. The cylindrical chamber may be made of any convenient material. The rod end of the chamber is made of thin steel .007 inch thick, and the end of the rod is attached to it with rivets. Near the other end of the chamber is a copper diaphragm—10-gauge material.

Operation is Simple.

The operation of the device is simple. The tubes are placed in the ears, and the point of the rod is rested on that part of the engine from which the

noise seems to come. The vibrations pass from the motor through the rod to the steel diaphragm, setting it in motion, and the vibrations are transferred to the ear.

Saves Repair Bills.

With this device in your tool-kit you can always be on the lookout for engine trouble. The stethoscope will warn you that trouble is approaching, and, if you heed it, it will save you many dollars that would otherwise be spent in repairs.—Eugene Schwartz in Popular Science Monthly.

AUTOMOBILE GOSSIP

Motor vehicle registration in Alabama exceeds 11,000.

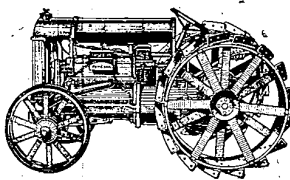
