### A GROWING COMMUNITY.

Farmington, Clarenceville, Walled Lake, Novi, North Farmington and Farmington Junction have all grown within the last year in spite of the general business lethargy throughout the State and Nation. Boards of Commerce have been organized and many stormy sessions have been held in these bodies in most of these communities; however there is no progress without strife. Where action is in evidence there will also be friction and gravity. For these forces of nature are present in any undertaking whether it may be political or social or economical. Man's greatest struggle since the dawn of life has been overcoming these two great forces. And the communities will eventually negate to a degree these forces in their meetings, for balance and checks will work for harmony. If every citizen would keep the idea in mind of community good and welfare above personal selfishness, it would go a long way toward community harmony. Compromises will be necessary on public improvement questions, and each man must do his share toward the upbuilding of the community in which he lives.

Selfishness and evil motives in civic affairs were scolded by Wm. Otto, secretary of the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce, in a recent address before the members of the Marysville Chamber of Commerce. "Allow no selfish motive to creep into your organization," said Mr. Otto. "A selfish dominant group kills a commercial body quicker than anything else." The spirit of working together was emphasized by the Pontiac man who said that the success of

a town or city depended not so much on the advantages or natural resources of that place, as the human element involved in the spirit of the town. He pleaded for a unified spirit toward a common goal that would bring everything desired to the reach of Marysville residents. He cited cases of manufacturers moving their plants to places where there was an organized body of men in a commercial organization that was boosting for the town and said that manufacturers often shunned towns where the natural resources were better but that had no organization to boost the town. He said that manufacturers wanted to know about living conditions in a town to which they contemplated moving, rather than the commercial advantages. Mr. Otto went on to say a commercial body should see to it that living conditions in its town are among the best in the country and, if possible, the best.

## ROYAL OAK PASSES 100th ANNIVERSARY

ARRANGES HOME-COMING DURING SHROTTOWEEK  
AUG. 29 TO SEPT. 3.

Attractions Include Shrine Band, Patrol and Chanters, Aerial Flights, Open Air Shows.

Royal Oak will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the first white settlement in the township, and also the recent incorporation of the village as a city, during "Shroto Week," Aug. 29 to Sept. 3.

This big homecoming event will bring many former residents back to their home town which in twenty years has grown from a village of 468 to a city of more than 6,000. Many families are planning reunions, and countless informal gatherings doubtless will be held when the "Old Times" get together.

Thousands of visitors from all this part of the state are expected. Masonic bodies from Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties are to be present and take part and scores of amusements have been arranged to provide a busy and enjoyable time for everyone who is fortunate enough to be able to attend.

The Shroto committee, headed by George E. Weitzel, as manager, says: "It's a big homecoming week in Royal Oak when the Masonic bodies will provide outdoor amusements, afternoon and evening, for every man, woman and child. It's a carnival and a county fair combined, and then a lot more, besides."

Open air shows, novel entertainments, wild west show, the country store and thirty booths that will make the craziest crabs laugh are among the attractions.

### Aerial Thrills Daily.

Aerial thrills will be given by an expert flier each evening at 8:30. Passengers will be carried on flights each day.

Musical by the best organizations in Detroit will be provided each evening. The Moslem Shrine band with the Arab Patrol and Chanters, will be one special feature. The Highland Park Commandery is to be a grand drawing card. Shadukam Grotto with its band also will entertain visitors. The Ford band and Anderson's orchestra are other music dispensers.

### Shroto Organizes Own Band.

Shroto is to have its own band, too. John B. Peters, the leader, is recruiting members and plans to have 75 musicians out on the opening day of the carnival, afternoon and evening. The bandmen are to be attired in nondescript olive uniforms of various colors and designs. The band, which will be one of the features of the carnival, will lead the parade on opening night, Monday, Aug. 29.

### Open Air Dancing.

A rustic bower, with a specially built dancing floor, has been erected near the Masonic temple so that all who desire may enjoy dancing every evening in the open air.

Harry C. Philp is the director of the Moslem patrol band.



Showing the invention Applied to an automobile.


