tee the limiting of armaments, the security of the world's peace, and the race between rival navies of the world and make possible a brotherhood of nations, then the last state of the world will be worse than the first. Not only will riot and revolutions be rampant in Europe with its accompanying suffering and desolation, but the scenes will be set for the next great struggle which will be on the Pacific side of the world, while America still ministers to need on the other side of the Atlantic, for it will mean that America must be the source of supply for food and other necessities for the stricken portions of Europe and America will have to give for we shall become the soup kitchen for the world's bread line. Thus trade will be hampered and the industrial life of the land suffer.

Duty calls to us as never before, not only to actively interest ourselves in the conference but help provide its spiritual background, for the great conference that must settle the troubles of the world, Brotherhood, democracy, liberty, peace are the great moral phases of the conference. This is a time when every American citizen in the pride of his noble heritage of liberty should lift his heart to God that He will guide and uphold the men of the great conference that the right decisions may be effected. People prayed during the war; the nearness of death, the bloodshed and privation of war were the visible stimuli to prayer. This day calls for the unemotional, unstrained, unbrokening of the soul of the American people.

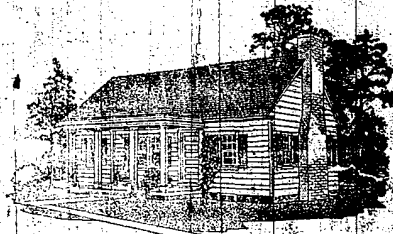
At a session of said Court, held in the Probate Office, in the City of Pontiac, in said County, on the 26th day of October, A. D. 1921.
