ness.

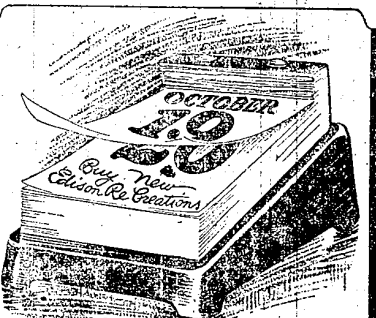
The money spent for advertising  
creates profit quicker than the

any other staple goods, and the  
good will obtained is worth more  
than its cost even if not a cent's  
worth of goods are sold.

Be patient, "Rome was not  
built in a day," advertising is not  
a "Get-Rich-Quick-Wallingford"  
scheme. It is more like building  
a house—first the foundation is  
laid by a complete plan of cam-  
paign; next the superstructure is  
raised by the right kind of litera-  
ture; then the frame is boarded in  
with clear, concise explanation; it  
is floored by convincing argument,  
and roofed by the proof of that  
argument.

Can a complete house be built  
in a night? Neither can a busi-  
ness, so don't expect advertising  
to do the impossible.—Print Talk.

Feasible to Train Crows.

## THE AMERICAN RED CROSS IN PEACE TIME Disease Prevention



Through its Health Service the American Red Cross has begun a nation-  
wide concentrated effort in co-operation with established organizations to  
reduce greatly the amount of preventable disease and physical defects found  
among the country's 100,000,000 population. Education is its most powerful  
tool. Special attention is devoted to children, and this picture shows a typical  
Red Cross welfare clinic where little ones are treated and mothers instructed  
in the proper care of them.

barefoot and the boy on the left is wearing clothes made of scraps from the  
battlefields. They have just received winter clothing, food and condensed  
milk for the baby. Similar work is being done for Russian refugees, driven

### Week's News in Brief

Check Shipping Board Assn.  
Washington—Rufus C. Dawes,  
brother of Director of the Budget  
Dawes, has been assigned to check  
up liabilities and assets of the United  
States shipping board.

Confederate Veterans in Reunion.  
Chattanooga, Tenn.—Gen. Julian S.  
Carr, of Durham, N. C., was elected  
commander-in-chief of the United  
Confederate Veterans and Richmond,  
Va., was selected for the 1922 re-  
union.

More Foodstuffs for Russia.  
New York—The steamer Elzasser  
left for Petrograd carrying \$100,000  
worth of foodstuffs, the gift of Ameri-  
can labor to starving Russia. A  
similar shipment left Philadelphia last  
week.

Famous Character Dies Suddenly.  
New York—William B. "Bat" Mas-  
terton, 66, one time western gun  
fighter and deputy U. S. marshal, but  
more recently a widely known sport-  
ing writer, dropped dead at his desk at  
the Morning Telegraph.

Mrs. Burlett Given 3 Years.  
New York—Mrs. Emma Richardson  
Burlett of Hilldale, Indiana, was  
sentenced to the penitentiary for  
forging the endorsement of Theodore  
Roosevelt to a note for \$69,000. The  
length of her sentence is limited to  
three years.

Rains Extinguish Forest Fire.  
Hot Springs, Ark.—General rains  
have extinguished the forest fires  
which have been raging 15 miles north  
of here, on the United States forest  
reservation. The fire swept over  
about 10 square miles and destroyed  
timber on more than 6,000 acres.

Two Flyers Killed in Crash.  
Honolulu, T. H.—Lieutenant Eric  
Bouquet, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Staff  
Sergeant Vernon E. Vickers, of Mont-  
gomery, Ala., were killed when their  
airplane crashed in flames while they  
were attempting to join a flight for-  
mation at a 2,000 feet altitude.

Woman Anarchist Wins Point.  
Jefferson City, Mo.—Mollie Steimer,  
convicted New York anarchist, will  
not be deported to Russia as sched-  
uled, because of an error in the ad-  
dress of commutation papers, releas-  
ing her from the Missouri peniten-  
tiary on condition she is deported.

Professor Files Cruelty Charges.  
Boston—Willis Allen Park, sociol-  
ogist, formerly instructor of psychol-  
ogy at the State Normal C. Jege at  
Ypsilanti, Mich., has filed suit for di-  
vorce charging his wife, Lillian  
Parker, whom he married 3 years  
ago, with cruel and abusive treatment  
and desertion.
