### SNOW PENITENTS OF ANDES

Remarkable Illusion Which is Brought  
About by the Action of the  
Elements.

In the higher Andes of Argentina  
and Chile, within a very limited re-  
gion, where there is a polar climate in  
which no human beings can dwell, the  
so-called Snow Penitents assemble.  
The traveler comes unexpectedly  
upon a great throng of them, gathered  
on the barren slopes of a mountain  
peak. Seen from a little distance  
they have the appearance of a crowd  
of hooded monks, all in white and  
knelling in serried lines. It is a re-  
markable illusion, for the "monks"  
are not human at all, nor alive. Each one  
of them is a block of snow and ice.  
One theory of this phenomenon is that  
the fallen snow may be of uneven  
density and that the powerful rays of  
an overhead sun first melt those parts  
of it around the denser spots, leaving  
the latter still frozen, to assume the  
form of snow men.

As the snow continues to melt, water  
trickling down from the blocks may  
help to deepen the surrounding bot-  
toms, while prevented from accumulat-  
ing in the latter by the slope of the  
mountains. The arrangement of the  
white figures in rows may be explained  
by the slope, the water all draining in  
one direction. This, however, is only  
one of several theories offered in ex-  
planation of the "Snow of the Peni-  
tents," as it is called in that part of  
the world.

Tuesday.

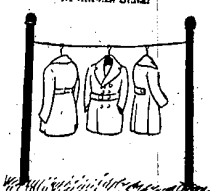
"Sabbath Day's Journey."

distance that the law of the Jews (and

permitted one to walk on Sunday. In  
Acts 1:12 the Sabbath day's Journey  
is placed at the distance of Mount Oli-  
vet from Jerusalem. Anyone could  
walk the distance from the city  
around the suburbs, and by the rule  
of the Levites this distance was fixed  
at a circumference the radius of which  
was 2,000 cubits. The Talmud places  
the Sabbath day's Journey at 12 miles.

Melpomene, the Muse of Tragedy,

was the muse that presided over  
tragedy. She is generally represented  
standing, with her left foot raised on  
a rock, and holding in her right hand  
a mask, such as was worn by tragedi-  
ans.

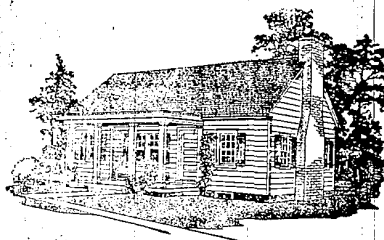
