 He offered for sale was pure and wholesome so that mothers might give it to their little ones with confidence. Mr. Hull was the last speaker and he has visited Farmington so often during the past few years that he was regarded as an old friend by many in the audience. He stated that no one realized better than he that the dairymen of Michigan had been pretty hard hit and that present day conditions were not encouraging, but he advised all who had a good herd of dairy cows to stick and to take special pains to have their milk in a good marketable condition at all seasons of the year. He expressed the opinion that the farmer with a good herd of cows was riding the waves of the present business upheaval more comfortably, and with greater safety than those who were depending upon general farming. He advised his hearers to economize in the management of their farms and to make sure that all of their cows were worth keeping—that they returned something for their feed and care. As an industry the dairy interests must be conducted upon a little higher plan than formerly and that greater care must be exercised in the care and management of herds. Dairymen, he declared, must put their house in order if they expect to ride the storm of lowering prices.
