School District No. 5, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan.

Notice is hereby given that a Special Meeting of the said School District will be held in the School House in said District on the 14th day of February, A. D. 1922, at 7:00 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said district the proposition to borrow the sum of Twenty thousand dollars, and to issue the bonds of the District therefor, bearing interest at the rate not exceeding Five and 1/4 per cent per annum (5 1/4 per cent) payable semi-annually, said bonds to be in the denomination of one thousand dollars each and to mature as follows: The first and second bonds to mature at the expiration of twenty (20) years and the remaining bonds to mature at the rate of Two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars per year, said funds to be used to build and equip an additional building on the present school building and for the purpose of purchasing additional lands for the school in said district. IMPORTANT!!

TO OUR PATRONS—

We have been thinking for some time of buying all our milk on the test plan as it gives the farmers an incentive to produce a better grade of milk. At the present time some of our Patrons are producing milk testing 3 per cent and receiving the same price as others that are producing 4 per cent milk. We have decided, therefore, that on and after February 1, 1922, we will purchase all milk on the following test plan:

Regular Detroit delivered price less hauling for all milk testing 3.4 per cent; 3.5 per cent; 3.6 per cent—hereafter to be known as “Standard Milk.” For example the February price for milk delivered at Farmington is \$2.27 for 3.4 per cent; 3.5 per cent; and 3.6 per cent milk. Milk testing above 3.6 per cent to receive the usual addition for every 1-10 point increase in the test. Milk testing below 3.4 per cent to receive the usual deduction for every 1-10 point decrease in the test. Remember that it is just as important in the winter months as well as in the summer months to take the animal heat out of the milk IMMEDIATELY after milking.

If you think you have a low testing cow or two, bring in samples of milk from these cows and we will gladly test them.

If you intend to increase your herd make sure the cows you buy are good testing stock, and if possible, tuberculin tested.

We advise all Patrons to use Corrupted Milk Coolers and Sanitary Strainers. We will get these articles for you at cost. See us about them.

DEDICATION OF NEW CHILDREN'S HOME.

(Continued from Page 1.) atmosphere will be dominant and assistants. The rooms are ample and airy, admitting floods of sunshine all the time. The two dormitories will care for fourteen children in each, and are located on the second floor with the rooms strictly home life its program. The home will care for twenty children, a House-Mother, assistant House-Mother, cook and other domestic of the House-Mothers, the toilets and baths, also the infirmary. The third floor will be used for bedrooms for members of the staff and an isolation room. On the first floor are located the large living room, reception room, dining room, kitchen, coat room, and other rooms. The play room, furnace and fruit room, are in the lower floor. The public is invited to visit the home at 4 p. m.

The dedication service will be an interesting event and open to the public. The chairman will be Mr. Charles Holcroft of Detroit, who is the chairman of the Board of Trustees. Bishop Theodore Henderson will deliver the dedicatory address. Other speakers will be Dr. N. E. Davie of Chicago, and National Secretary of the Board of Home and Hospitals of the Methodist church; Dr. E. J. Warren of Detroit; ex. S. D. Evers and others.

At the close of the dedication service afternoon tea will be served to the visitors.
