### A WORTHY EXAMPLE.

People in all sections of the world have, this week, observed the anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birthday. In story and in song his greatness has been heralded and his life has served as a worthy example for people in all lands and under all conditions. In these days of strife and bickering, of sharp business practices and the desire on the part of a great many people to seek unfair advantage over their fellows, it might be well to consider one particular trait of Lincoln's character which impresses itself upon the minds and hearts of the people of his time.

Nothing in the character of Lincoln stands out more clearly than his freedom from personal resentments. He was President of our country in a hard and a stormy time. To make his life harder and his great work more difficult, he not only had public enemies, his country's foes to reckon with; but there were also enmities, jealousies, and misunderstandings among those who should have been his friends. There were acts of disloyalty and hostility toward the President himself; but he refused to notice them.

"He knows all about it but he will not do a thing," reported a secretary in one of the offices. It was not that Lincoln did not feel or that he did not care. And in his position he had ample power to retaliate; but he would not use his power in that way, neither would he stoop from his great position to indulge in any petty, personal strife. "I never thought," he said, "when some one spoke of resenting such injuries. 'No man resolved to make the most of himself can spare time for personal contention. Still less can he afford to take all the consequences including the spoiling of his temper and the loss of self-control.'"

The years have rolled on, and all the voices that once were raised against Lincoln have long been silent. Criticism and abuse are forgotten, and he stands a great character in our country's history—a kind, patient and magnanimous as well as a lofty leader. His view of the proper treatment of offences and personal injuries is surely worth consideration. For these things come into all our lives. We do not live very long in this world before we meet unkindness and injustice from one source or another. Selfishness, jealousy or actual dislike wrongs us in some way, and we are hurt and angry. The first natural feeling is to repay the debt in kind, and inflict hurt in return. One far greater than Lincoln, one from whom the President learned his wisdom, told us long ago, but we must forgive instead of seeking revenge.

It is not an easy law, but those who keep it soon learn, as did the President, that it means a great deal more than being kind to wrongdoers; it means self-protection as well. It is not only mercy to the one who offends, but it is a safety for the one who is injured. Abraham Lincoln was right. Resentment is something that no one can afford to cherish. It makes the spirit bitter, drives out high thoughts, and darkens and spoils the life. No one can be angry and be happy at the same time. If you are going to climb to your highest place and do your best work, you cannot afford to carry grudge; and resentments in your heart.

Registration of Absentee by Oath.

If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, and shall, under oath, state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the Village Twenty Days next preceding such election, designating particularly the address of his or her residence and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself or some member of his or her family or owing to his or her absence from the Village on business or his or her other business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall be permitted to vote at such election.

If such applicant shall in any manner, wilfully, make any false statement, he or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

Provision in Case of Removal to Another Precinct.

Any registered and qualified voter who has removed from one election precinct of a village to another election precinct of the same village shall have the right on any day previous to election day, on application to the village clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book in which he or she has been removed to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she then resides. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of election of the precinct from which he or she has been removed a certificate of transfer and presenting the said certificate to the board of election inspectors of the precinct in which he or she then resides.

Women Electors.—The names of all qualified Women Electors not already appearing on the registration list will be registered, in conformity with the foregoing provisions.
