Washington's Ancestors Distinguished for Centuries.

High Ideals of the First President a Heritage From Men Who Had Made England Great.

February 22 is the birthday of that son of Virginia and of old stock of the British Isles, without whose high endeavor and fortitude there would possibly not be upon the earth today a United States of America.

It is worth our while from time to time, even to an irreverent and forgetful age, to remind ourselves what price was paid by those who went before us for the heritage we enjoy—and what virtues were practiced by them to make that payment possible and to complete their purpose.

Washington was of a type that might face ill at the pulpit those days. He was austere with an austerity that some of his contemporaries termed arrogance. He was dignified with a dignity that would fill the nostrils of the "hustings" and appeals for votes today. He believed in the leadership of those whose attainments qualified them for leadership. He thought that education and experience in handling large private affairs were useful to men intrusted with large public affairs.

Under the control of an iron will he held the passions, which have and again flamed out at cowardice or demagoguery or corruption.

He possessed what was then the largest private fortune in the thirteen colonies. He traveled the world for centuries through a line of English "country gentlemen," and he maintained the use of a coat-of-arms granted his forefathers—a coat of arms perpetuated by his suggestion of the coat of arms and flag of the American Union.

He was moral heir of the barons who exacted the Great Charter from King John at Runnymede, of the school of John Hampden and the earlier Oliver Cromwell, rather than of Harrison and Garibaldi. He would have been at home with the men who ousted James II rather than with those who finally beheaded Charles the

First. There was nothing in him tolerant of the West. Tyler that England has bred along with her Shoguns and Drakes and Fairfaxes and Lovelaces.

He believed in the propriety of great possessions. Social justice in his time did not exact of Americans the attention given to economic justice—then right to work and trade, and he properly paid for the doing—and that in turn gave way in the public mind to the related rule of political justice.

So it came about that the American Revolution was initiated, fought and won on the ancient principle of the British constitution, "No taxation without representation," which the colonists declared should govern this side of the Atlantic as well.

Washington believed that great possessions of mind or of matter imposed great obligations. He believed that the "able-man" owed a debt to his fellows in the measure of his ability. And he carried into his public service a fortitude which no disaster could break, a sense of duty that no opposition could swerve, and a conscience which willingly raised "fifteen minutes" and "sacred honor" for the public cause in which he was enlisted. He set no store on lofty station save as it gave opportunity to help his country and his constituents, and for the seeker and the time server he entertained the stern contempt visited likewise upon the politician and the charlatan.

Michigan News Tersely Told

Grand Rapids—Charles Holden, acting postmaster, took the oath of office Feb. 5 as collector of internal revenue for the district of western Michigan.

Kalamazoo—Western State Normal's rural progress day will be observed March 10. A conference for county normal teachers is planned and appropriate addresses will be delivered.

West Branch—Vernon Hayes, aged 30, was fatally injured at Edwards by being hit by a car thrown by a saw. He was rushed to the local hospital where he died of a fractured skull soon after. He owned a garage at Alger.

Muskegon Heights—With the lightest city election held in 10 years, the new Muskegon Heights charter was adopted with a vote of 188 to 69. The new charter embodies practically every feature of the present charter of the city.

Lansing—Thefts of automobiles decreased 33 per cent last month, according to a report made by Charles J. Deland, secretary of state. There were 96 thefts of autos during January, whereas 131 were stolen in December, according to the report.

Ann Arbor—Michigan was sixth of all the states in the Union in the increase of electric light and power users during 1921, figures just completed by the National Electric Light association and received by the public utilities information bureau here.

Ann Arbor—The trial of Peter Orland, Detroit, taxi driver, charged with complicity in the murder of George Berg, Saline farmer, and Henry Fulmer, farm hand, in August, has been postponed. Prosecuting Attorney Fahrner leaves for Florida next.

Lansing—If Michigan is to have a new prison it should be in the Upper Peninsula, where the inmates can be made to work in some quarries to turn out high-grade material. George Groeckel, told members of the State Administrative Board and State Prison Commission.

Saginaw—One of the strangest accidents on Pere Marquette railroad records occurred near Farwell when a car of potatoes jumped the track 10 feet clear of the right of way and burned up, but the rest of the train, as if by human hands, continued along with no damage.

Eastland—Oakland County Farm Bureau has begun civil suits against B. G. Mills and V. G. Mills, White Township farmers who failed to pay their annual membership fees of \$10 in the bureau. If the suits are successful, the bureau threatens to bring them against delinquent members.

Ionia—The home of Edward I. Pirvot, manager of the Ionia Metal & Iron Co. was entered while the owner was out of the city and a strongbox containing about \$2,000 in bonds and other valuable papers was carried away. Deeds to property and insurance papers were with the bonds.

Saginaw—Damage estimated at \$13,500 was caused by fire of undetermined origin which destroyed the "Old Mill" and several other buildings at Riverside park, a summer amusement park on the outskirts of the city. Firemen had to climb through 14 inches of ice in the Tittabawassee river to get to the blaze.

Hastings—Edgar and Daniel Bore are held here as suspects in connection with the bidding of a beating to death of Eutolph Nordberg, dairy farmer, near here. Fingerprint prints will be taken and compared with fingerprints of the man who was killed. The body was discovered in the kitchen where the body was discovered. Robbery it is said, was the crime motive.

Houghton—Arrive Pyokkyren of Pelkie, Houghton county, has been selected by the state of Michigan to take charge of the reindeer herd, being brought here from northern Europe as an experiment in fur propagation. Pyokkyren had experience with reindeer in Finland. The state has yet made no decision as to whether the herd is to be located.

Houghton—The Michigan Pike's association will include the Copper Country in its tour this year for the first time in the history of the organization. Several hundred members will spend an entire day in this district visiting points of interest in Houghton and Keweenaw counties. They will arrive the afternoon of July 12 and leave the morning of July 14.

Afton—A 60-year-old tract of second growth oak is being removed by George Ewing of Jowettville from the farm of A. J. Howell, south of Afton, and is yielding logs 60 and 70 feet in length. The land, which has been in the Howell family since no present owner's grandfather, A. J. Howell, virgin land in the "timber" was first cleared by the latter six decades ago.

Grand Rapids—The public service commission of the city has begun an investigation to determine the source of a large number of crows, woodchucks, rats and sparrows present in the city for bounty. Action was taken following a declaration by County Auditor Charles L. Brown that he could not understand how so many woodchucks could be killed within the city limits. "I found that a man was making \$100 a month on bounties on crows and woodchucks," Brown says. "He was having them shipped in from outside."
