I AM THE GOVERNOR.
Robert Roberts, who was up until last week a member of the state police, and had a record for efficiency and faithfulness to his duty.

Now he is out of the organization just because in the discharge of his duty he had the audacity to dare treat Alex Groesbeck, the governor, the same as he would any other offender of the traffic regulations of the state.

The specific charge brought against the officer was "conduct unbecoming an officer" in stopping the governor in his disregard of the public safety by speeding through a village when on a joy ride accompanied by a lady friend.

When the governor was stopped he was requested by the officer to turn around and return to Farmington to headquarters, but refused to do this. Then he was told by the officer he would remain where he was until Roberts, who was down the line came back.

Roberts came back and inquired what the trouble was and upon ascertaining the cause of the detention said to the irate driver, who proved later to be Groesbeck, he would either put up \$25 for his appearance in court or leave his car to which the governor demurred and then Roberts discovered there was a gun in possession of the governor so he said "Are you an officer?", to which the governor answered in the affirmative. At that point Roberts said, "Who are you and what official position do you occupy?", and was told that his name was Groesbeck, then Roberts said, "Are you any relation or affiliated with the governor?" and was astonished when he was told, "I am the governor," so he was let go.

The governor then went to "Col" Vandercok the head of the public safety commission and with much venom aired his views regarding the kind of men the colonel had on his force, in such a way that the colonel felt it was his duty to the governor, not the state, discipline someone, and someone was Roberts, for daring to stop the chief executive of the state of Michigan, while doing his duty, who was taken to Lansing and given a court martial trial of the drumhead type and discharged.

But the end is not yet. Those who know of the affair and the conduct of Lansing officialdom are very bitter against them and the governor and are urging Roberts to commence a damage suit against those who have caused him to suffer the loss of position where he was making a good showing as an officer.

Had Alex Groesbeck, the self-appointed dictator of the state of Michigan, told the boys when they stopped him who he was and that he did not need to be exceeding the speed limit and complimented them upon their observance and execution of their duty instead of raising a row which resulted in the discharge of an efficient officer, he would have made friends where he has lost them now.

He is mighty small as a man, and is another part of the state official family who spends part of his time on his job for the state and the rest for the looking after his own personal business.

It is not general known, especially up-state that this self-appointed dictator, rules the state from Detroit, putting in a few hours each week at Lansing. It is taught in the public schools that the capital of the state is at Lansing, when in fact it is in Detroit or in an auto between the two places in so far as Alex Groesbeck and some other state officials are concerned.

It might be well enough for the voters of the state this fall to decide whether they want part of his booty or high-handed action that caused the officer's release, and the voters have a right to know that their governor assumes the laws of the state are for them but not for him to observe.

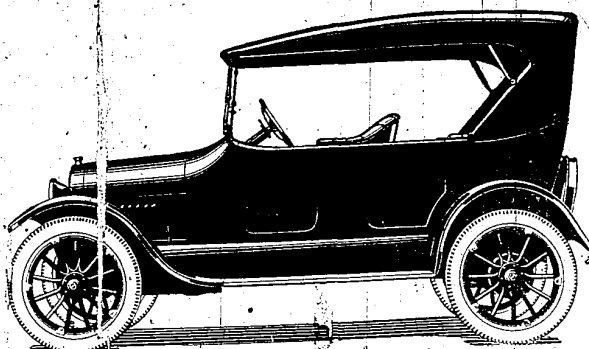
