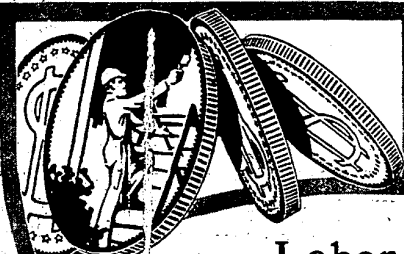
The laying of the corner stone of the consolidated school was largely attended and the program was well carried out.
