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**Farmington Boys Win**  
Second Place.

The track team representing the public schools of Royal Oak was the winner in the grade school track meet held on the Lincoln School grounds at Ferndale, it was announced here today by Robert D. Lynd, Y. M. C. A. secretary in charge of making the awards.

Farmington public schools boys were second, and Lincoln School boys of Ferndale, were third. Each team will be awarded a banner for its showing.

The competition which was conducted jointly by ten public schools of the county and the Oakland County, Y. M. C. A., was open only to public school students. The various events were divided into five weight classes, and each school was compelled to enter contestants in each class. The scores represent the average points made by the various teams in each event of the five classes of five events each.

The meet was witnessed by more than 800 persons. C. S. Angell, county Y. M. C. A. secretary of Barry county, was the referee, and 15 school men were the officials.

The following is the average standing of the various teams: Royal Oak, 290.8; Farmington, 286.8; Lincoln of Ferndale, 272.2; Lacey, 269.9; Rochester, 254.5; Log Cabin of Clawson, 253; Starr, 242.7; Oak Ridge, 241.5; Birmingham, 241.4; Berkley averages not yet compiled, but low in list.

Individual high point winners in the respective weight classes who will be awarded medals for their work are: 60 to 80 pound class, W. Craig, Starr School, 82.81 to 85 pound class, J. Hurley, Royal Oak, 71.34; 96 to 110 pound class, E. Billel, Lacey School, 66.2; 111 to 125 pound class, M. Graham, Farmington, 67.8; unlimited class, T. Williams, of Rochester.—Pontiac Press.

**Nitrogen Increases The Fruit Tree Blossoms**

Applications of nitrogen caused much heavier blooming in fruit trees this spring in a fertilizer experiment of the Michigan Agricultural college horticultural division than was found on other trees in the same orchard.

In 1921 there were practically no differences in the number of blossoms produced in the different plots in this orchard, according to Prof. B. E. Marshall, of the college department, although there were contrasting differences in yield, the fertilized plots producing seven times as much as the unfertilized ones.

This spring the percentage of spurs which produced blossoms was determined, and the results showed nitrogen to have played a very important part in increasing the blossom percentage. Only six per cent of the spurs on non-fertilized trees produced blossoms, while slightly more than four per cent of the spurs on a plot receiving 10 pounds of acid phosphate per tree during each of the past three years produced blossoms.

Fourth plot received applications of nitrogen alone or in combination with phosphorus and potash, and while there are some differences in number of blossoms produced in the different plots, nitrogen is apparently the only element responsible for increasing the average percentage of spur forming blossoms to more than forty.

**Tony Yarnick Brought Back.**

Tony Yarnick, 21-year-old Bohemian, wanted in Oakland county since September, 1921, for shooting former Deputy Sheriff Leonard Schnell, of Ferndale, was brought back to Pontiac Saturday morning at 11:30 o'clock, from Detroit, by Sheriff James S. Bulter and Deputy Arthur Putnam.

The officers got Yarnick at Detroit police headquarters this morning after state officers who had received him from Canadian authorities had taken him there from Windsor, Ont. Yarnick was brought to Windsor last night from Kingston Penitentiary, Kingston, Ont., where he was discovered some weeks ago serving a long term for carry concealed weapons. He was registered in Kingston under a fictitious name.

He was extradited from Kingston at request of officials of the state department of public safety, so he could be turned over to Oakland county authorities, who hold a warrant charging him with shooting Schnell with intent to kill.—Pontiac Press.
