On the threshold of its seventy-third year, the Michigan State Fair...

It is now nearly three quarters of a century—73 years—since the early Michigan settlers held in Detroit the first state fair west of the Allegheny mountains.

As times change, institutions must advance in step with them. Thus it is that the Michigan State Fair, now representing an urban as well as a rural population, has added many features which appeal mainly to those who live in the cities.

Michigan State Fair Facts

Dates—September 1 to 10; inclusive.

Place—Michigan State Fair Grounds, northern outskirts of Detroit.

Program to be widest in range ever attempted by state fair in the United States.

Radio, dog show, running and automobile races, historical pageant, baby show, tourist camp, million dollar livestock parade, boys state fair school, horseback picnic, chess, championship tournament, county exhibits, government exhibits, grain exhibits, now being planned.

Coliseum, greatest fair building of its kind anywhere, to be opened. Seats 5,000 people and houses 100-foot ring where judging may be seen by all.

All agricultural and industrial activities of state to be mirrored. Probable attendance—500,000 people.

MOTORISTS LOSE GALLONS OF GAS

Inefficient Working of Automobile Engine is Cause of Leakage of Costly Fuel.

FAULTY COMPRESSION BLAMED

Disarranged Motor May Appear to Run Fairly Well, but Trouble Occurs When Car is Being Run at Moderately Low Speed.

Thousands of gallons of gasoline are wasted every day by motorists because of the inefficient operation of their engines.

An important detail to watch to keep the engine running efficiently is the compression. A motor with faulty compression may appear to run fairly well when driving the car at a reasonable speed or when it is working hard.

How to Tell It

Under either of these conditions the engine will run with an irregularity that makes the car jerk or jump instead of running steadily, as it should.

In fact, gasoline mileage may be cut nearly in half through compression.




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
