In the fall of 1912 Washtenaw county Republicans organized the nomination of Oakland county's candidate, Frank L. Covert, who unfortunately lost the republican nomination in the primary election of that year, was defeated by a democrat.

For this reason many staunch republicans, not only in Washtenaw county but in the entire county as well, have been pushing the writer to become a candidate for a second term.

On the other hand it has developed that there are equally staunch republicans of Oakland county who prefer to overlook the nomination feature of the agreement and to interpret it strictly on the basis of each county being represented for alternate periods of two terms each.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Moved by Trustee Lamb and supported by Trustee Russell that village allow \$150 to pay Plymouth Band for services on Galt Day, given by American Legion, Sept. 4, 1922. Carried by roll call All Yees.

Moved by Trustee Lamb and supported by Trustee Russell that Board and Street Committee confer with committee appointed by American Legion as to building of boards and polishing of streets on Galt Day, Sept. 4, 1922, and that all concessions operated by persons during the summer of 1922 be removed. Marshall Street Committee and committee appointed by American Legion. Carried.

Moved by Trustee Lamb and supported by Trustee Cook that President, Marshall, Street Committee and Trustee Russell investigate parking proposition at Farmington Junction. Carried.

On motion of Trustee Johnson supported by Trustee Lamb the meeting was adjourned.

TO THE REPUBLICAN ELECTORS OF OAKLAND COUNTY

The friends of Leonard R. Schnell take pleasure in presenting to the Republican Electors of Oakland County his name as a candidate for the office of Sheriff of Oakland County at the Primary Election to be held on September 12, 1922.

Mr. Schnell was born on June 21st, 1881, and has lived in Oakland County all his life. At the present, he is living in the Village of Ferndale, Royal Oak Township. Mr. Schnell has never held any public elective office and no official position except that of Deputy Sheriff, to which he was appointed by present Sheriff Butler on January 1st, 1921. Mr. Schnell was actively engaged in the duties of the office of Deputy Sheriff from that time until September 16th, 1921, and during the time he was in the Sheriff's Office, was active in a number of important cases, particularly that arising out of a robbery committed in Livingston County by the Conti Gang.

was while in pursuit of this gang of bandits, at which time they were in the western part of Oakland County, on the 26th of May, 1921, that Mr. Schnell was shot in a gun fight with these bandits, at which time he sustained a broken arm and minor wounds which kept him from active duty for a period of some three months. The four men, who survived the battle, were afterward convicted in Livingston County, and sentenced to long terms in prison.

Shortly after resuming his duties again, Mr. Schnell was shot once more on the 16th of September, by Tom Yarnik and Edward Wiseman, two gangsters from Detroit, who are at the present time serving long sentences in Marquette and Jackson prisons. On this occasion Mr. Schnell was in the hospital for a period of thirty days, during a part of which time, it was an open question whether or not he would live or die.

During the time Mr. Schnell was actively engaged in the office of Deputy Sheriff, he was one of those deputies who worked on a salary, but since December 1st, 1921, Mr. Schnell has not been actively engaged in the duties of the office and has not since such time, received any compensation from Oakland County.

In presenting Mr. Schnell's name to the Electors of Oakland County for their consideration, the parties who know him best, feel that he is worthy of the office which he seeks and if nominated and elected thereto, he will make a sheriff of which Oakland County can be proud. He is not a candidate of any faction either political or otherwise, and he is simply standing upon a platform of fair and equal enforcement of all the laws and a square deal for all.

G.W. Dickinson Acts to Prevent Disease Infecting Livestock

Persons planning to exhibit horses, cattle, sheep, swine or livestock of any nature at the Michigan State Fair, Detroit, September 2-10, need not worry about danger of contagious diseases.

George W. Dickinson, Secretary and Assistant Inspector of every possible preventer of disease at the Michigan State Fair, Farmington, Mich., at a visit to the state veterinary for the purpose of making a survey looking for the cause of many diseases.

Many reports will be placed in each building where livestock is on exhibition. Most of these were caught last year, which prevented their spreading with the comfort of any of the horses or cattle.

No livestock will be allowed to be exhibited until thoroughly examined for disease. Every precaution will be taken to prevent horses or cattle coming into contact with disease, unless they have been admitted to exhibition.

The health department of the City of Detroit will maintain careful supervision of the food supply at the State Fair. Not only will careful inspection of the food given livestock for disease and poisonous feeds be made, but preparation of traces for fair visitors also will be supervised. Sanitary drinking fountains will be erected everywhere on the grounds.

Runners to Hold 6-Day Meeting at State Fair. An announcement that harness horse racing had been dropped from the program of the Seventy-third annual Michigan State Fair, Detroit, September 1 to 10, and the running horses substituted, has been made by George W. Dickinson, secretary and manager of the fair.

The runners will come to the State Fair from Quebec, Woodville, Toronto, Windsor, Havre de Grace, Plattsburgh, and other southern tracks for a six-day meeting, opening Labor Day, September 4, and continuing through the following Saturday.

It is expected more than 150 horses will be quartered at the fair grounds and preparations now are under way to house the runners. A paddock will be constructed just south of the grandstand.

W. J. Dowling, who has successfully conducted harness racing at Owosso, Bay City, Grand Rapids, Jackson and Adrian lately, will direct the six-day meeting at the State Fair, Mr. Dickinson said.

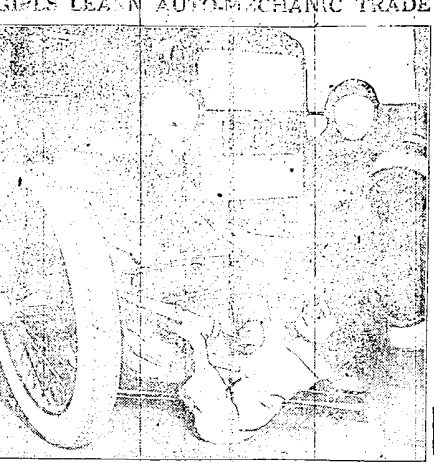

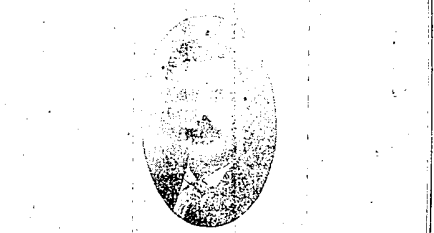
