Margaret Moore attended the foot ball game at Ann Arbor Saturday and from there went to Lansing and spent Sunday with Miss Blanche Murray.

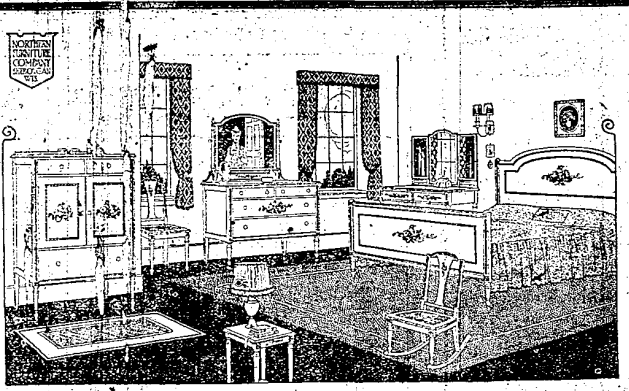
