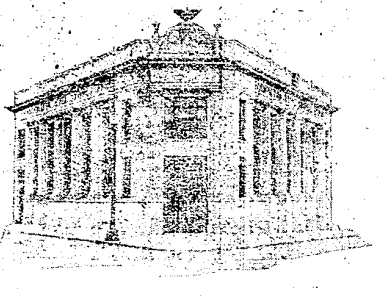

**New Milk Gage Now Used.**  
A simple gage has recently been developed by the bureau of standards of the Department of Commerce for determining the height to which milk and cream bottles are filled. The gage is applied to the outside of the bottle, and makes it unnecessary to remove the cap or disturb the contents. The measurement can be very quickly made, and the milk is not affected by it as it would be if the cap had to be removed. This gage was used in an extensive investigation of the points to which bottles are actually filled in practice. Several thousand bottles were measured, samples being taken at random from the ice boxes of dairymen and grocers in several of the larger cities of the United States. The new gage permitted the bottles to be tested in the store and returned to the dealer, thereby making it possible for the bureau officials to make many measurements and at a lower cost. It is thought that the gage will also be of great help to local weights and measures officials in checking up the filling of bottles within their jurisdiction.

### Red Cross Field Of Action Covers All the World

Represented by 93,686 members, the American Red Cross penetrates to nearly every part of the world. The insular and foreign roll call statistics for the past year are a most conclusive manifestation of the Red Cross spirit carried into the most remote lands in Europe there are 4,038 members; in Turkey, and active in the Constantinople Chapter, 3,545; China has an enrollment of 2,262; Africa 136; India, 231; and Australia, 22. Even Vladivostok, in frigid Siberia has a life chapter with 100 members. The Philippine Islands can mobilize 58,747 under the "Red Cross banner" and Hawaii 7,832. The total funds raised through foreign and insular membership enrollment and sent to national headquarters in Washington amounted to \$60,216.54, while an additional \$23,469 was forwarded for the endorsement of the American Red Cross. The high seas roll call in 1922 was an inspiring success. The Navy signed on 4,331 for the Red Cross and the merchant ships 431. Of the total membership outside the United States 82,990 are registered with chapters in foreign lands, the insular possessions and dependencies.

"I want to; therefore I can!" is the spirit that spurs the Red Cross worker in well-doing.
