GOVERNMENT LANDS STILL OBTAINABLE IN OAKLAND COUNTY

Eleven years ago Mr. and Mrs. John Hall, of Mahopac, entered upon a homestead comprising an island in Voochess lake and considerable of the territory covered by the lake. They found it impossible to get across to the lake because their property was surrounded by neighboring farms, so for years they kept relinquishing and renewing their homestead rights. They waited until the land about the lake was subdivided by a local real estate man and then bought a lot on the shore so they might have use of the roads.

Last April Mr. and Mrs. Hall and their little daughter, Barbara, moved to the island where they built a small home. They also have a small farm, which they work, three miles distant. Their home, however, is on the island. Mr. and Mrs. Hall plan to commute the property; living on it for 14 months and then purchasing it from the government for the prescribed \$125 an acre. They still have nearly seven months to live on the island before they can purchase it.

Mr. Hall has been a resident of Oakland county for 50 years and Mrs. Hall was born in this county although her residence has been only since her marriage, 25 years ago.

Another somewhat rare real estate transaction was placed on record recently with the filing of a United States patent to 80 acres of land in Pontiac township, by L. C. Van Hecke of this city. A feature of the proposition is that the patent covers land located on the bottom of Lake Angelus. Because of the fact that few farmers would purchase land on which there was a lake it was practically impossible for the government to sell this particular piece of property.

Since most of the property is under water it was impossible for anyone to homestead it and put the land to crops, so Mr. Van Hecke called the attention of government officials at Marquette to the position in which this land was placed. It was therefore advertised for sale and Mr. Van Hecke purchased it at an auction.

The value of the land lies in the fact that earth from the lake bottom can be used for the purpose of reclaiming marsh land. This is the purpose to which Mr. Van Hecke will put it. Within a few years, he says, dredging operations will convert a large number of marshes into sound building sites and many ponds into clean, desirable lakes.—Pontiac Press.
