GLISTENING ROBES OF WHITE-WASH.

To casual observers the Detroit and state law enforcement officials who were recently "probed," "investigated" and "one man juried" present a beautiful appearance in their glistening robes of white-wash. To the more observant there is still an outline of the ugly skeleton showing right through the coating so carefully applied.

J. D. Hackett, industrial engineer, says labor turnover in United States costs the country over \$900,000,000 annually. In some industries turnover averages 100 per cent. He points out loss to employers and cost of replacement, and loss to employee in looking for a new job.

Aggregate value of new building permitted in 134 American cities in October totaled \$187,822,241, as against \$157,526,327 in the preceding month and \$142,669,638 in October of last year.

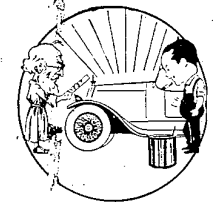
