**GROUND IN GROOVE PISTON RINGS**

These rings introduce a feature which has been overlooked by motor manufacturers up to the present time. To begin right, let us consider now, after all the special piston rings that have been made and used, whether they have accomplished any more than the ordinary step cut piston ring. We will let you answer this from your own experience.

It is a recognized fact that the step cut piston ring had one weak point, and that was of permitting lubricating oil to pass by it up into the combustion chamber. This became more and more pronounced as the rings became worn in their grooves. Different methods have been employed to stop this, with very little success. Now let us examine the rings and their grooves. First, the rings may not have been made with a perfect surface on their sides, which must have an air-tight fit to the wall of the groove before it will function properly. Second, perhaps the groove wall is rough from machining or the ring and the groove may have been used long enough to have caused these surfaces to become smooth. If such is the case it will be noticed that the rings have excessive clearance in their grooves. Now a piston ring is one form of a valve. It would be considered bad practice to not grind a valve to a perfect seat before assembling into a motor. It would also be bad practice to not assemble a spring on a valve sufficient to hold it to its seat. Imagine the action of a valve which had not been seated and which had no spring to hold it to its seat and you will have the action of a non-seated step cut ring in a groove.

Ground in Groove Piston Rings are a special high wall pressure step cut ring made enough narrower than the groove to insert the flange of a grinding clamp. This clamp, being made in halves, is held together at the ends with the slitted ends of a yoke—the yoke being used to rotate the clamp which grips the ring. "A" or "B" grade of Clover Grinding Compound is used. All rings must be ground to lower side of groove. After a perfect seat is obtained a corrugated shaped spring is inserted on upper side of the ring to hold it to its seat. This compensates for all wear, increases the length of time the rings may be used by at least three times. The efficiency of the motor never diminishes.

There is absolutely no oil pumping after rings have worn to fit cylinder wall, and, lastly, the efficiency of the motor is increased twenty-five per cent.
