Mr. and Mrs. J. Condit and family of Hamburg, visited Ker brother, Charles Walling and family Sunday.


Mr. and Mrs. Lyman Farrand attended the funeral of his brother at Eaton Rapids Saturday, who died at a Detroit hospital.
