

Downriver preps slip by OLSM

Orchard Lake St. Mary's basketball coach Bob Shoemaker got part of what he wanted from his team in last Wednesday's game with Southgate Aquinas.

Shoemaker had complained that his Eagles had lacked intensity in their Catholic C-D League showdown with Wyandotte Mt. Carmel a week ago. Mt. Carmel won the game and the conference championship, 50-44.

The team bounced back from the loss with a strong contest against Aquinas, but injuries to key personnel cost OLSM a shot at victory, as the Raiders claimed a 58-50 win in overtime at St. Mary's Dombrowski Fieldhouse.

OLSM had the early lead, ahead 21-18 at half. The Eagles biggest advantage, a five-point lead, came in the first half but Aquinas quickly erased that margin in the last two quarters.

Aquinas had a 48-46 lead in the final seconds of the fourth quarter when sophomore forward Hiram Harris came an 18-foot jumper at the buzzer to knot the score and force the overtime.

OLSM drew first blood in the extra period on a Don Butcher basket. But Dan Kelly, a 5-foot-11 senior guard, hit a basket for the Raiders to tie it again at 50-50.

OLSM NEVER recovered, as Aquinas built up an advantage on free throws. Kelly's two foul shots with seven seconds remaining clinched it for the Raiders.

Despite the loss, Shoemaker was pleased with the play of his squad. "We got a lot of what we wanted," he said.

"(Tim) Domske, our college coach, said to me after the game, 'Coach, you're not being realistic. Look at your size, your experience — you expect too much.'"

"He may be right, but I don't believe in giving the kids an excuse for losing."

OLSM's chances of beating Aquinas, which had qualified for the Catholic League's A-B playoffs, took a severe blow when starting center Ed Okuniewski hurt his ankle in the first minute of play.

Okuniewski didn't play the rest of the game and Shoemaker wasn't certain how long the injury would keep him sidelined. Also on the bench was Carl Pellegata with a sore shoulder. Pellegata broke his collarbone playing football last fall and it appears that surgery may be needed to repair some lingering problems.

Don Smeznik, Harris and Butcher helped fill the scoring void left by the absence of Okuniewski and Pellegata. Smeznik, a 5-11 junior guard, pumped

Matt Martin, a three-year starter for Orchard Lake St. Mary's football team on both offense and defense, has accepted a full athletic scholarship from Holy Cross University in Worcester, Mass.

Martin (6-4, 225) was an All-League selection for two straight seasons while playing on both the offensive and defensive lines. He was OLSM's most valuable player and co-captain two straight years. He started as a sophomore on St. Mary's 12-0 state championship team in 1977.

Several schools were interested in Martin, but he had narrowed his choices down to Central Michigan, Annapolis, Brown, Cornell, Harvard, Syracuse and Western Michigan before choosing

Holy Cross. He excelled off the field as well, earning a 3.8 grade point average.

Martin also competed on OLSM's basketball, rowing and track teams.

Local named Colt trainer

Dave Barringer, a Farmington native, was picked as the assistant trainer for the Baltimore Colts pro football team.

Barringer, 24, began his training career when attending Farmington Harrison high school. From there he moved to Michigan State University, where he served as student trainer for five years.

His first association with the Colts was in 1977 when he worked as student trainer at their training camp at Goucher College. He also worked at the 1979 training camp and worked in the training room on game days.

He graduated from MSU in 1978 with a degree in physical education and is presently working on his masters. He also was employed by Towson State University as head trainer, the first person at the school to hold a full-time job at that position.

Barringer will work under the Colts' head trainer, John Lopez.

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SECOND AMENDED RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING BOND AND EXECUTION OF COLLATERAL DOCUMENTS

(Exotic Rubber and Plastics Project)

At a special meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington Hills, Michigan, held in the City Hall in said City on the 27th day of February, 1980, at 7:30 o'clock, p.m., Eastern Standard Time.

PRESIDENT: Wolf, Alkateeb, Oppertbauer and Lange.

ABSENT: Soronen, Dolan and Burwell.

The following resolution was offered by Alkateeb and seconded by Oppertbauer: WHEREAS, this Council, on May 14, 1979, determined to issue City of Farmington Hills Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (Exotic Rubber and Plastics Project) in an amount not to exceed \$2,785,000 to finance certain industrial facilities which are to be leased to Exotic Rubber & Plastics, Corp. (the "Company") during the term of such bond issue; and

WHEREAS, this Council, on September 17, 1979, adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of its City of Farmington Hills Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (Exotic Rubber and Plastics Project) in the amount of \$2,785,000, and authorized the Mayor and Clerk of the City to execute the collateral documents necessary to carry out the provisions and purposes of the Bond; and

WHEREAS, due to increased costs of the industrial project to be acquired, constructed and equipped and leased to the Company, this Council, on December 17, 1979, amended its Resolution of Intent to issue Revenue Bonds so as to increase its intent to issue City of Farmington Hills Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (Exotic Rubber and Plastics Project) to an amount not to exceed \$3,285,000 to finance the industrial facilities; and

WHEREAS, this Council, on January 28, 1980, adopted an Amended Resolution authorizing the issuance of its City of Farmington Hills Industrial Development Bonds, Series A, B and C (Exotic Rubber and Plastics Project) (the "Bonds") in the amount of \$3,285,000 and therein authorized the Mayor and the Clerk of the City to execute the collateral documents necessary to carry out the provisions and purposes of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, this Council of January 28, 1980, approved and adopted, pursuant to the aforementioned Amended Resolution, an amended bond resolution entitled "A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF A SERIES A, A SERIES B AND A SERIES C INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BOND (EXOTIC RUBBER AND PLASTICS PROJECT), OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS, MICHIGAN, FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING OF A PROJECT COMPRISING A MANUFACTURING FACILITY LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS, FOR THE LEASE AND SALE THEREOF TO EXOTIC RUBBER & PLASTICS, CORP., IN ORDER TO PROMOTE THE INDUSTRIAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS, PROVIDING FOR THE PLEDGE OF REVENUES FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAID BOND; AND AUTHORIZING AN INDENTURE TO SECURE FURTHER THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SUCH BOND" (the "Amended Bond Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, the first paragraph of Exhibit I to the Amended Bond Resolution sets forth an interest rate payable on the principal amount of the Series A Bonds of this bond issue to be at a rate of seven and one-half percent (7 1/2%) per annum; and

WHEREAS, the interest rate that was agreed upon by the City of Farmington Hills, the Company and Michigan National Bank of Detroit, as the Bondholder, and which should have been reflected in said Exhibit I, is the rate of seven and three-quarters percent (7 3/4%) per annum.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

1. That the first paragraph of Exhibit I of the Amended Bond Resolution be revised to reflect a rate of interest payable on the principal amount of the Series A Bonds at the rate of seven and three-quarters percent (7 3/4%) per annum.

2. That this resolution be published in full in the Farmington Observer, a newspaper of general circulation within the City of Farmington Hills, at the earliest possible time.

3. Except as amended herein, the Amended Bond Resolution shall remain in full force and effect as adopted on January 28, 1980.
