

Free Shot Clinic Changes Location

FARMINGTON The Farmington-Claireville immunization clinic of the Oakland County Health Department to all preschool and school age children without cost has been moved to a new location, starting Jan. 28.

This first clinic will be conducted in the First Methodist Church, 3312 Grand River, from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Subsequent clinics will follow on the second and fourth Wednesdays of February and March and once monthly beginning in April, during the same hours at the new location.

A notice will appear in The Farmington Enterprise & Observer about one week before each clinic and will be sent home from the schools planned for each clinic. Those desiring only immunizations for their children are asked to use the Grand River entrance to the church. There is parking available at the rear of the church.

IMMUNIZATIONS OFFERED at this clinic are: the diphtheria-tetanus-whoping cough-polio vaccine (quadruple shot); the DTP (triple shot); the DT (diphtheria-tetanus booster shot); the oral (Sabin) polio vaccine; the smallpox vaccination and revaccinations; the tuberculin skin test (Tine); the hard measles (Rubella) vac-

cine; and the newly approved German measles (Rubella) vaccine.

Physicians generally do not approve giving several live virus vaccines at the same time to children. For example, at one month should elapse between administering the hard measles, the German measles, or the smallpox vaccination, in that order.

The TB skin test is usually given first along with the DTP vaccine, followed monthly with the other necessary vaccines. The smallpox vaccination is discouraged for children with eczema, and not given during the summer months because heat rashes, poison ivy, and other skin rashes are more prevalent then, and the vaccine could be absorbed in other areas causing multiple blisters and scarring.

THE RUBELLA VACCINE, which the Oakland County Health Department will be giving at the clinic, has been grown on duck and chicken embryos, so any child allergic to these substances will not be given this vaccine.

**Security
Raise Due
On April 3**

The 80,000 people in Oakland County receiving Social Security benefits will have the 15% increase added to their checks due on April 3, 1970. Elnor J. Helms, Fondiac District manager, announced. A special check covering the increase for January and February will come out later in April.

No one has to apply for the benefit increase, Helms said, the job will be done automatically. Work has already started on refiguring the benefits of over 25 million Social Security beneficiaries in the United States, and it must be done without delaying regular monthly checks.

The average benefit for a retired worker in Oakland County is \$120 with the increase, and for a husband and wife as much as \$180.

The increase in Social Security payments will be financed out of present revenue, and will not require additional taxes, Helms said.

WHEREAS, the Federal Government by Section 104 of the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1960 has provided the authority for the establishment within the designated boundaries of Federal-Aid Urban Areas, as defined by Section 104 of Title 23, United States Code, of a program of Federal-Aid Urban Operations Program to increase capacity and safety;

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration through the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and Bureau of Public Roads (BPR) by Policy and Procedure Memorandum dated January 17, 1969 and supplements thereto, hereinafter referred to as FPM 18-1 as well as pertinent information Memoranda, has established policies and procedures relating to the expenditure of Federal Funds for TPO's;

WHEREAS, the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Oakland, Michigan, has expressed its willingness to accept the responsibility of coordinating with all other local agencies the development and execution of an area-wide TPO's plan in accordance with the provisions contained in FPM 18-1 and other pertinent information Memoranda; and

WHEREAS, the local governmental agencies will benefit from the TPO's plan and will be able to coordinate their efforts in the development of the TPO's plan and to provide for the development and execution of a TPO's plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Farmington City Council hereby approves the TPO's program and actively supports Stage 1 of the program which is the study and evaluation of the TPO's plan;
