conservative within the party. "Although I'm issue-oriented, I'm not dogmatic," Molin said.

The primary political philosophy is that the political action within a party must recognize that there is a need for the three major segments of society—government, business, and labor—to work together to solve problems. These three segments are allies, not opponents.

Government alone can't solve the nation's problems but its participation is needed, Molin said.

**Hare Takes A Poke At Yeager**

The political trail began 10 years ago when Molin was involved in the Richard Nixon presidential campaign as a student at Northern Michigan University in Marquette.

"I got involved in the local Republican Party and this led to other political activities," he said.

This included work for the Citizens for Michigan organization, which spearheaded a petition drive which led to a special convention to rewrite the state constitution.

During the convention, Molin served as a research assistant intern. During that convention Molin gained the "working experience and exposure to Romney" to get into partisan work on a full time basis.

He went to work as a staff representative for the Republican State Central Committee, with responsibilities in the six-county southeastern Michigan region.

He worked for the successful drive to have voters adopt a new state constitution and a year later, worked as a "delegate hunter" for Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York who was then seeking the party's presidential nomination.

He then worked in various special assignments for the state party before being asked to go to Milwaukee, Wis., three years ago to help rebuild the Milwaukee County Republican organization.

He returned in May, 1967, as executive director to then-Wayne County Chairman Henry Sladek, whom Molin succeeded last week after Sladek's move out of the county.

Molin got out of politics on a staff basis last year when he went to work as the executive director for the Detroit CBD Association.

Although a long-time organizational man, Molin doesn't adhere to the "traditional Republican philosophies."

He stressed his admiration for such GOP liberals as Mayor John Lindsay of New York, U.S. Senator Jacob Javits of New York, Gov. Milliken, Romney, Rockefeller, and U.S. Sen. Charles Percy of Illinois but pointed out that he also has respect for moderates and conservatives.

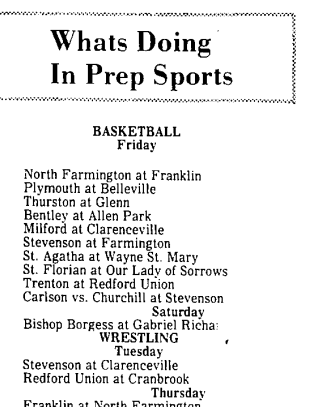

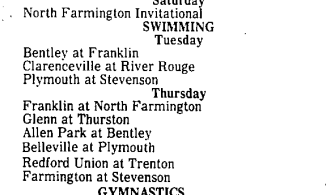
