WINDFALL REVENUE: By a vote of 215-201, the House refused to endorse spending a larger share of revenue from the new tax on oil company windfall profits for energy development and conservation. The vote came on a non-hinding measure suggesting ways to allocate the \$227 billion the windfall tax is expected to raise in the 1905s. 


