If a team captain were to be selected, Labser's John Segula — who capped an undefeated season with a state championship title at 112 pounds — would be the most likely candidate. SEGULA, A two-time O&E All-Area wrestler, was a perfect 42-0 this season to finish his high school career with an outstanding 117-12 record (90 percent winning average). Last year, Segula placed sixth at the state meet (112 pounds).

Segula has been wrestling since he was 10 years old, and has represented the United States in competition in Iran and Germany. He has been an Ama-teur Athletic Union (AAU) state champion several times.

"He's a tremendous wrestler on his feet — he scored 126 takedowns while giving up only two," said Kebl of Seguda, who is heing recruited by several Big 10 and Big 8 conference schools, "The thing that sets John apart from other wrestlers his great competitive spirit and tremendous self-confidence."
