

All-staters pack all-area wrestling squad

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Lahser teammate Joey Levier finished second at the state meet, and registered a 38-5 record (35-22 career mark). Levier, who has been recruited by Western and Eastern Michigan universities, won four overtime matches this year.

Allen finished third at the Class B state meet for Avondale.

The Oakland Athletic League (OAL) champion holds school records for most career pins (71), most season pins (29, last year), most season takedowns (65) and most team points scored in one

season (235). His career record ended at 91-12-1.

Murphy, Masters and Bausano all finished fourth at the state meet in their respective weight classes.

MURPHY WAS 39-5 this season, including a regional first-place finish. He won both the Schoolcraft and Plymouth state tournaments.

Sporting a 146-24-1 career mark, Mariani is a three-time state qualifier. He is a two-time Metro-Suburban Association (MSA) champion and finished with a 53-5 record this year.

"He's (Masters) a good student of wrestling, and he's one of the people we could count on all the time," said Adams coach Keni Ballo.

Bausano finished with a 42-8 record, and was first at the regional meet. He was also a Greater Oakland Activities League (GOAL) champion.

A regional title, Denny was 37-9 for the season. He was second at the Salem tourney and third at Schoolcraft. LeClere had an undefeated (37-0) record entering the state class B finals, where he eventually split four matches to finish with a fine 39-2 season mark. In 76 career wins, LeClere — a regional and OAL champion this year — registered 37 pins.

Thompson is a two-time MSA champ and state qualifier. He finished with a 42-7-1 overall record, and was 102-29-1 three years as a middleweight wrestler

for the Highlanders.

An aggressive wrestler, Fallon was second at the regional, and won the Birmingham-Bloomfield tournament. Fallon finished with a 31-10 mark.

FISHER, Lemanski and Houtteker were all regional qualifiers.

Fisher finished 33-11 on the year, while Lemanski was 35-4. Houtteker was 22-7 with 22 pins. O'Leary said Houtteker, an all-state football player who had 41 pins during his three-year wrestling career, split his time between heavyweight and 198 this year.

Kehl has coached 13 years at Lahser, where his teams have finished among the state's top 20 in the each of the last two seasons. Last year, Lahser was 19th. The Knights improved to ninth this winter.

In 1976, Kehl's team won the Class A district title at Rochester Adams. Kehl started the Olympic Wrestling Club in

Birmingham (where Segula learned wrestling fundamentals) 10 years ago. Kehl attended Bowling Green University, where he played football. In 1961, he was the Mid-American Conference (MAC) heavyweight champion.
