ALL SERVICES rendered to the community from the league is on a volunteer basis. Members function out heir homes, or public meeting rooms.

"We have interviewed our public officials, locally, statewide and nationally and kept track of their voting records on selected issues." Mrs. Carter said. "We've written thousands of lefters placed and received even more ters, placed and received even more phone calls and brewed countless cups

She adds that of the \$10,000 local budget, all but \$2,000 was generated by onations and dues from the members themselves. Some money came from fees earned through free member labor such as precinct reporting for ABC.
