# Jewelers aim for function, fashion

A fine line exists between what jewelry is and what sculpture is. A ring — no matter how exotic the design — loses its purpose if it is not designed to stay upright on the finger.

Sewlry that is uncomfortable or awkward to wear might just as well remain in the showcase.

These are premises sometimes forgotten by those who work with precious metals and stones. That's why it's important to remember function as well as design when purchasing custom jewelry.

One store specializing in custom jewelery is the Morris Bednarsh Jewelers in Southfield's Applegate Square shopping center.

jeweiery is the Morris Bednarsh Jeweiers in Southfield's Applegate Square shopping center. The business is a partnership between Bednarsh and Tony Ferrari, who employ 12 full and part-time people in the pursuit of adornment. "We can do just about anything related to jeweiry." Ferrari says. "We attempt a lot of things that are more or less technically improbable, but we always seem to succeed." According to Ferrari, there are some 8,000 molds for different kinds of jeweilery — rings, pendants, bracelets and earrings. Designer jeeces, for which the mold is destroyed after a certain number are produced, are also available.

Everything but watch repair and engraving is done at the shop, with the partners more than ready to attempt any project that strikes a customer's fancy. Bednarsh, the main designer, attempts to insure that customers get jewelry that is earable — not just impressive to look at.

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If you have an unset stone, a setting can be designed for it. There are stones available as well at the store, as well as piles of unstrung pearls and beads of semiprecious substances such as jade.

To get a custom-designed piece, you simply walk in, describe what you want, and let Bednarsh go to work.

You will be shown a wax replica of the ring or other piece. Once it's approved, the design is cast (usually ing gold) and finished to your liking.


There are also finished pieces on display that can be purchased.

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The only hard part about the process is the cost. The store has earings for under \$50, but the prices soar with the amount of design time, stones, precious metal and labor involved.

A bracelet set with diamonds can easily run into thousands of dollars. For those, however, who want to express their individuality as well as make an investment, custom jewelry is well worth the price.


