Capture the fleeting moments of childhood

Did you know that children are the most photo-graphed of all subjects? only a photograph can pro-vide an enduring record of the growth and activities

vide an enduring record of the growth and activities of a child.

Because these pictures will grow more meaningful and priceless as time goes by, the photographer must use the utmost care and attention to portray the precious times of childhood. Most important in photographing children is capturing the spirit of childhood. Infants, of course, are unaware of the camera and their "spirit" is easily obtained.

But as children reach the age of four or five, they become very aware of the presence of a camera and do not respond well to posing directions. Stiff poses and artificial expressions will tend to replace a natural look, and it is only after the camera is put away that the child's naturalness returns.

But if a child is enjoying a loy or an activity of his own choosing, he becomes unaware of the camera and capturing the child's "spirit" will be easy. So the first and most important thing to remember in successful child photography is to concentrate on candid pictures.

The unplanned and the unexpected provide the opportunity for that exceptional photograph of your child. The objective is to capture the fleeting expression and momentary action rather than to attempt to pose the situation.

Here are some related tips to help you get better shots of your childers.

Use a telephoto lens. By using a medium telephoto lens (about 100-200 mm), you can keep your distance and not intrude on your child's activity. He may not even know you are there.

• Use an assistant. A helper will be a source of distraction and can coax a happy, natural expression from the child.



Get on the child's level. Lower the level of the camera - even get down on the floor! Children live in a world of giant adults and huge surroundings. By getting low, you can capture a child's perspective and greatly improve your pictures.

Use outdoor lighting. Overcast days provide the best lighting for "people" pictures. The lighting is soft, and harsh shadows are eliminated. On sunny days position yourself so that the sun is behind your subject and use a flash to fill in the shadows.

Use indoor lighting. Natural light from a window can be very pleasing. Or, use a bounce flash to get softer, more even illumination.

Use fast film. For outdoor candids, use a fast film. This will enable you to preset the camera at a small lens opening to increase depth of field. Also, set the camera at a fast shutter speed to be ready to catch a fleeting expression or freeze a child's leap in air.

By photographing children naturally you'll be able to capture the spirit of youth that your family and friends will enjoy for many years to come.

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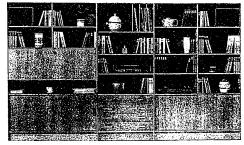
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
