

B'ham-Bloomfield, Southfield dominate cage squad

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Area first-team Vincent Bean to 17 points.

Birmingham Groves' Al Campbell fills out the first team. A 6-2 senior, Campbell led Groves in scoring and rebounding, averaging 16 points and 12 rebounds per game.

Campbell was the Falcons' floor leader, averaging six assists per game. He shot 48 percent from the floor and 72 percent from the free-throw line.

Campbell was a two-year starter for the Falcons. Groves coach Gary Sharpe called him the team's "top all-around ballplayer, very decorated and very hard-working."

SECOND TEAM

Rochester's Chris Ribant and Rice's

Brian Brennan tied for the top spot on the second team with 38 points each. Ribant had the edge in first-place votes with two.

A 6-1 senior forward, Ribant captained the Falcons. He averaged 18 points and 10 rebounds per game and was Rochester's best defensive player.

"Chris Ribant," said Rochester coach John Bailey, "is the best total basketball player at Rochester High School in the last decade."

Brennan was "The Man" for Brother Rice. The 5-11 senior ran the offense from his point guard position, and was responsible for the opposition's best guards on defense.

Brennan found himself up against such formidable opponents as Detroit East Catholic's Anthony Grier and first-team All-Area selection Tim

Wu. He held Wu to 17 points while matching that total the first time they met.

Labser's Mill Carthens took the third spot. A first-team All-Area football selection, Carthens shot 50 percent from the field, and averaged 12 points and 10 rebounds per game.

The 6-5, 225-pound senior — one of the area's truly big men — has a football scholarship to the University of Michigan.

Jim McKnight, a 5-10 guard from Southfield-Lathrup, was the fourth man named to the second team. McKnight led Lathrup in field-goal and free-throw shooting, hitting 55 percent from the floor and 82 percent from the line.

McKnight was the Chargers' floor leader, averaging six assists per game. He will attend Alma College.

Rice's Paul Jokisch, a sophomore, is the only underclassman to be ranked among the first 10 players. A 6-4 forward, Jokisch saw heavy duty this past season on the Warriors' front line.

THIRD TEAM

Don Butcher of Orchard Lake St. Mary's polled the most points for the third team with 38. A sophomore like Rice's Jokisch, Butcher is a two-year starter. He captained St. Mary's during both his freshman and sophomore years. He also led his team both years in minutes played.

The 5-11 Butcher averaged 14 points, eight assists and three steals per game. He is both an All-Catholic League pick and the Most Valuable Player in the C-

D Central Division of the Catholic League.

Forward Greg Manning led Rochester Adams, averaging 15.7 points per game. A 6-3 senior, Manning shot 48 percent from the floor, 75 percent from the free-throw line.

Ron Gold teamed up with second-teamer Jim McKnight to give Southfield-Lathrup what coach Jim Kourakis called "the best guard duo ever at Lathrup."

Gold, a 5-11 senior, finished his career the second-best assist man in Lathrup history.

Rob Jeske, a 5-10 junior guard, captained the Birmingham Seaholm team. Jeske shot 54 percent from the floor, 80 percent from the free-throw line. He averaged seven assists per game.

Tom Phelps, a 6-3 senior forward

from Walled Lake Central, led his team in scoring, averaging 17.0 points per game. Phelps shot 45 percent from the floor. He was a first-team All-Inter-Lakes League selection.

COACH OF THE YEAR

John Maloney, the third-year Bloomfield Hills Andover coach, is the 1979-1980 coach of the year.

It isn't often that the selected coach finishes with a losing record. But Maloney's team, despite a serious lack of height and only one bonafide player in Tim Meter, finished the year at 10-12. The Barons lost six of their games by less than six points.

Andover made it to the Seaholm District finals before bowing to Brother Rice, 49-43.

WB tankers sparkle

The West Bloomfield Swim Club's girls' 200-yard medley relay (Kim Goodrich, Jenny Bedore, Julie Schneider and Leslie Frye) finished first in 3:09.06 in a mini meet for eight- and under swimmers March 15-16.

The same four girls placed second in the 200-yard freestyle relay (2:51.37) and took thirds in the 100 freestyle relay (1:11.41) and the 100 medley relay (1:22.35).

Leslie Frye and Julie Schneider combined with Mike D'Errico and Ross Novak for the mixed relays. The group finished third in the 200 free relay (2:36.71), fourth in the 200 medley relay (3:07.76), fifth in the 100 medley relay (1:23.79) and fifth in the 100 free relay (1:08.05).

West Bloomfield's boys' eight- and

under relay (Ross Novak, Carlos Bustos, David Notarius and Mike D'Errico) placed fifth in the 100 medley relay (2:22.24) and fifth in the 200 free relay (2:45.09).

Novak also placed in three individual events — the 25-yard breaststroke (second in 2:14), the 50 freestyle (third, 24.09) and the 25 backstroke (sixth, 20.38). Carlos Bustos finished sixth in the seven-year-old 25 freestyle with a time of 16.83.

The only West Bloomfield girl to place in the individual events was Jenny Bedore. She took fourth in the 50 breaststroke with a 46.98.

At the Okemos B meet, West Bloomfield's Susan Allen finished first in the girls' 13-14 200-yard breaststroke with a time of 2:53.6.



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
