

Local Jewish council plans for convention

Dorothy Kaufman and Helen Shevin, Franklin residents, have been chosen as co-chairmen of the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) Central District Convention, April 20-24.

The meeting is expected to draw 200 women from 11 midwestern states. The greater Detroit section of the NCJW is hosting the convention at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Dearborn.

Looking Toward Tomorrow is the convention's theme. Programs will include discussion of contemporary women's issues and exploration of the role of the press in public trials.

Mrs. Kaufman has served as the bulletin editor for the local NCJW section. She has chaired several programs, and served as corresponding secretary and executive vice-president of the section. She is active on the Brandeis University National Women's Committee and is a member of Congregation Shearar Zedek.

Political rhetoric prevails in race

What are they saying?

Recalling the observation shared by my professor of theology from seminary days that the greatest heresies are created by the isolation of texts, I have tried to delay judgments about the political speeches being made by the presidential aspirants in recent days. The gathering momentum of the various campaigns however, has nourished an intensity of rhetoric that I find extremely disconcerting.

It might be because I'm not a professional politician and unaccustomed to campaign rhetoric, but I think not. It has more to do with the kind of words being used, and what those words are supposed to effect.

In Lewis Carroll's "Through the Looking Glass," Humpty Dumpty tells Alice that it's better to get an un-birthday present than a birthday present. Alice doesn't understand and he has to explain that "there's only one day for birthday presents and there's glory for you."

This further confuses Alice, and Humpty Dumpty has to explain that "glory" means a knockdown argument. She doesn't agree with that, and Humpty Dumpty finally says, "When I use a word it means just what I choose it to mean, neither more or less." Alice can't agree with that either, and reminds Humpty Dumpty that the question is whether you can make words mean so many different things. He replies with finality: "The question is, which is to be master. That's all."

I CANNOT BELIEVE that the presidential aspirants want us to take their statements literally. Yet, the invective continues and the spectacle of a former president of the United States, a U.S. senator and other prominent public servants engaging in such vituperative language can only erode our regard for each other.

During the past months we have listened to Iran's Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini call for everything from "death" to "cutting off the hands of our elected leaders." It didn't take us long to suggest that he was a fanatic and completely irrational. He was also very different from the rest of us, and his total disregard for decency and justice gave us encouragement and reason to reject any credence to the substance of his claims for years of oppression at the hands of the deposed shah.

THE PRESIDENTIAL aspirants do not want us to take them literally, but they do want us to take them seriously. And so does Khomeini. Does that mean that we have become so careless in the use of words that we must use whatever will attract attention at the moment? Or does it mean that we have lost that sense of decency and respect, integrity and justice that enriches all life.

Alice believed that words are like objects you use to illustrate. Humpty Dumpty used words like empty boxes and put into them whatever he wanted. He was also willing to pay words for extra work. Our presidential aspirants may not mean what they say, but we are all the poorer for it, if they cannot say what they heard in recent days. If the current rhetoric of the political campaign speeches today is the mark of our mastery over life, we are indeed headed for very troubled times — of our own making.
