District cuts back to save funds

responsibilities can most easily be parcelled out to other people," Sheldon said at the March 28 session.

"We think these positions are important, but we were directed to identify two additional administrative positions and that's what we have done."

Termination of Evans and Barbut was opposed by a large turnout of residents attending the meeting. They suggested the loss of the two would greatly damage the athletic and outdoor programs.

THE BOARD rejected the Evans and Barbut terminations on a 4-2 vote. It then directed Sheldon to come up with two other recommendations for the March 31 special meeting.

At last Monday's session, Sheldon recommended terminating Adult Education Director Lawrence Barlow and Clifford Smart Junior High Assistant Principal Michael Couchman.

That motion was rejected 3-3. A subsequent motion to terminate Barlow and Evans was also rejected on a 4-2 vote.

Faced with the impasse, Lasher then proposed that the directive to terminate 11 teachers, three custodians and five administrators be changed to eight teachers, three custodians and three administrators.

That motion was approved on a 5-1 vote.

But board members told Sheldon there must be additional cutbacks in administrative personnel next year.

"The administration is forewarned that there must be a redesign of the administrative structure before next year," said Trustee Leo Wessinger.

Farmington student appointed at Alma

Jan Beynon, an Alma College sophomore from Farmington, has been appointed as a resident assistant at the college for the 1980-81 school year.

Alma's resident assistants advise other students in their respective residence hall corridors, communicate the college's policies and regulations, and provide overall supervision.

They are carefully selected upperclassmen who are chosen through a series of applications, recommendations and interviews. Among the qualities that are looked for in choosing a resident assistant are experience in leadership, outgoing personality, and experience in working with others.

Being a resident combines the opportunity to make significant contributions with very real career training for students in the position. The resident assistants are highly talented people who receive about 100 hours of training each year as part of their job.

Generally the kind of training they receive is not available until students have graduated and are in management training programs.
