

Atlantis swimmers capture short-course titles

The Birmingham-Bloomfield Atlantis swim club pulled off a coup of sorts recently, winning both the boys' and the girls' Short Course State Swimming Championships.

The boys won their meet, held March 21-23 at Clarensville High School, with 823.5 points. The girls clobbered the competition in their meet, held March 28-30 at Royal Oak Kimball High School, with 1014 points.

The girls' team won the 10 and under age group, the 11-12 age group, and the

15-18 age group.

Kara McGrath led the girls, winning high point honors in the 15-18 age group. McGrath won the 200-yard individual medley (2:12.74), the 1600-yard freestyle (17:21.42) and the 100-yard butterfly (59.35).

She was second in the 200-yard butterfly (2:08.45) and the 500-yard freestyle (5:10.71), third in the 400-yard individual medley (4:42.51), and fifth in the 300-yard freestyle (1:59.26) and the 100-yard freestyle (5:10.71).

McGrath teamed up with Cindy Greenawalt, Gina Bratrude and Tammy McGinnis for first in the 800-yard freestyle relay (7:58.66). The same team was second in the 400-yard freestyle relay (3:41.93).

McGrath, Greenawalt and Bratrude joined forces with Gigi Hommel for second in the 400-yard medley relay (4:08.84).

Susan Cashman won both the 200-yard breaststroke (2:27.00) and the 100-yard breaststroke (1:09.54) in the 13-14

age group. Both times were in the top 25 nationally for the age group.

Lisa Beni won the 100-yard butterfly (30.37) in the 10-and-under age group.

The team of Patti Mack, Molly Ames, Beni and Renee Brenner set a state record in the 10 and under 200-yard medley relay with a first-place time of 2:11.77. The time was in the top 25 nationally.

Brenner, Beni, and Mack teamed up with Gina Martocci for a state record in the 10-and-under 200-yard freestyle

relay (1:58.03). The time was in the top 25 nationally.

No single competitor dominated things for the boys the way McGrath did for the girls. In fact, the boys' team won only two individual events and three relays.

Mark Shagena tied for first in the 50-yard butterfly (27.95) in the 11-12 age group. Brian Brace won the 100-yard backstroke (1:06.05).

Brace and Shagena teamed with Mike Noonan and James Webster for first in the 200-yard freestyle relay (1:58.32). The time was in the top 25 nationally. The same team won the 200-yard freestyle relay (1:45.33).

The team of Mike Schmidt, Rob MacKle, Martin Holland and Dan Clements won the 800-yard freestyle relay (7:15.03) in the 15-18 age group.

Swimmers placing in the top 12 scored points for their team. All competitors swam in a qualifying round, the best six in an event advancing to the finals with the second six swimming in a consolation round.

Times listed below are times from either the final or the consolation round of an event. It is possible for a competitor swimming in the consolation round to post a time better than a competitor swimming in the final round and still finish below the finalist.

Prep cage star picks WMU

Wauun acknowledged as much.

With all the hoopla surrounding the recent signing of Clarkston's Tim McCormick to play basketball at the University of Michigan, the signing of another Tim to play basketball at another Michigan university has gone largely unnoticed.

Bloomfield Hills Lahser's Tim Wauun signed a letter of intent to play at Western Michigan University without the media circus attending McCormick's decision.

But there are parallels. Wauun's pick was something of a surprise. Most observers thought he would go to either Eastern Michigan University or Central Michigan University.

"WESTERN WASN'T really in it," he said, "until last week I went there and found I could play next year."

Wauun gave the usual reasons for his decision — reasons such as he liked the campus and the guys on the team. He also said that he and Western's first coach, Les Wotke, really seemed to hit it off. In the end, the little things — and the chance to start next year — tipped the balance.

"Compared to Eastern and Central," he said, "I liked it a little bit better. The basketball program is such that I have a really good chance of playing in the years to come."

In Wauun, Western gets a 6-4 guard

with a dynamite outside shooting touch. He started three years for Lahser. Wauun averaged 19.3 points per game this past season, shot 53 percent from the floor and 78 percent from the line, and set a Lahser record with 36 points in one game against Birmingham Groves.

Wauun's outside shooting should fit in with Wotke's plans for next season.

"HE'S TOLD ME he needs an outside shooter pretty bad," said Wauun. "They need a perimeter shooter and that's what he wants me to do."

The offense Western runs is a bit different than Lahser's pattern offense, but Wauun doesn't foresee any difficulty adjusting to it.

"It's motion," said Wauun. "You really don't have to learn it — just a few rules — it's really kind of free-lance."

Wauun won't be the only player familiar to area fans on the team. Mike Dietz, Brother Rice's point guard from a year ago, made the team as a walk-on.

And Walker D. Russell, late of the University of Houston and Oakland Community College, is transferring to Western. Wauun said Russell should be eligible to play starting the second semester next year.

Wauun, the son of Bloomfield Hills' Andover principal William Wauun, says he has a few general interests in business and communications, but he's still undecided about what to major in at Western.

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CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY COUNCIL MEETING March 31, 1980

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills held a special meeting March 31, 1980 at 7:30 o'clock P.M. Mayor Soronen opened the meeting. Members present were Burwell, Lange, Oppenheimer, Wolf, Alkateeb and Dolan. Others present were City Manager Savage and City Clerk Cairns.

Council confirmed the Special Assessment Roll C116-80 for dust control on all unpaved roads in the City.

After the public hearing Council approved the application for land fill, on lots 137 through 140 of Supervisor's Eight Mile Grand River Acres Plat #2, contingent upon complying to permit requirements.

Council approved Alternate II (82 miles of gravel road) for dust control and awarded the bid to Michigan Chloride Sales in the amount of \$120,348.33 this being the low bid, \$21.225 per gallon.

Council approved Alternate II (82 miles of gravel road) for dust control and the bid to be awarded to Michigan Chloride Sales in the amount of \$21.225 per gallon if it is determined not to use oil in the City.

Carter's Road Oiling, Inc. was awarded the contract for dust control on 25 miles of gravel road in the amount of \$69,660 that being the only bid and subject to the contractor submitting a performance bond by April 10, 1980.

Council authorized the administration to negotiate with Michigan Chloride Sales for the annual dust control program whether he would accept the additional 25 miles in the event it was needed.
