OCC to seek millage 'transfer' in June election

Oakland Community College will ask county voters June 9 to approve more operating money for the four-campus system without an increase in the 1.7 mills property tax rate.

The OCC Board of Trustees last week unanimously approved placing a millage transfer proposal on the June 9 ballot. That will be the same election in which voters elect board members and local K-12 school boards.

OCC IS seeking voter approval to transfer two-tenths of a mill, now applied towards bonded debt retirement, to the general operating millage.
Since 1984, residents in the OCC district have paid one mill (\$1 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) for college operations. As bond issues were approved for new campus buildings, the OCC tax rate increased to 1.7 mills.

building debts and can't be applied toward OCC operation and maintenance costs without voter approval. OCC would not transfer the two-tenths of a mill to the operating fund, according to President Robert Roelofs, "until we decreased our debt service millage."

Roelofs said the two-tenths of a mill 202 cents ner \$1.00 in assessed valua-

tion) "would net OCC approximately \$2 million" for its general fund.

"This proposition, which represents no increase in millage, might have an opportunity of passing," said Roelofs. The ballot proposal limits the transfer to two-tenths of a mill.

IF APPROVED the extra operating millage would not be levied until July 1981. Reclofs said the operating millage would be increased in stage, with the full two-tenths of a mill transfer completed two to three years after passage.

He said increased costs of new career programs in OCC's curriculum and higher building maintenance costs necessitate the millage transfer.

"We really were thinking about next year (for the millage proposal)," Roelofs said. But he added, "Some of the more onerous provisions of that more more onerous provisions of that more ment." led college officials to try the bailor proposal this year.

The Tisch Amendment, named after Shiawasee County Drain Commissioner Robert Tisch, proposes a 50 percent reduction in property taxs and requires that property tax increases be approved by a minimum 60 percent of the voters.

Tisch campaigners are collecting signatures to put the proposal on the November bailot.

Even though more than 60 percent of the state's voters rejected a similar Tisch ballot proposal in November

1978, Roelofs wrote board members that the newest tax cut effort "very possibly might be passed in November."

DESPITE THE trustees' unanimous vote, several were cautious about the millage transfer proposal's chances.
"I understand (echnically it's not an increase, but that's only technical," said Trustee David Hackett.

Hackett, who plans to seek re-elec-tion this year, said he'll vote for the transfer, but added: "I don't know if I can ask everyone in the county who doesn't have the same feeling about the college as I do to do the same thing."

Noting that the ballot proposal includes the word "levied," Trustee Suchair the millage campaign.

zame Reynolds said: "The ordinary guy going into that voting booth not worrying about OCC could care less and he's not going to want his taxes raised for anything."

OCC's one-mill tax for its general fund hasn't been increased since it was first approved by voters in 1984.
