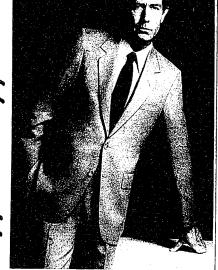
Inverrary will feature 84 rental units in three buildings. It's estimated to be valued at \$1 million.
