Eyeliner is used, she said, to make the base of the eyelashes look thicker. "Apply eyeliner to three-quarters of the upper lid, leaving the area closest to the inner corner of the eye free from color. The outer corner of the dishould be lined more heavily, lightening toward the center. The lower lid is lined in the same manner, from the outer corner of the eye to the center, only." The liner must then be softened by smudging and Mrs. Lauder suggests using the cap of the eyeliner pencil to smudge with.

Use an under eye concealer to hide dark circles under the eye, advised mrs. Lauder. But, rather than rimming the entire eye socket with concealer, apply in a triangle at the inner corner of the eye — with the point of the triangle ending just under the center of the eye. 
