Stop! Look at picture

A few weeks ago, we discussed the value of impact in your photographs and how impact can make the difference between ho-hum pictures and that shot that draws everyone's attention.

One of your best tools to add re-quired impact to your photographs is good composition. Composition can be thought of as the effective placement of the main subject and supporting ele-ments in the picture. Elimination of un-necessary and unwanted details in a photograph also are good composition.

The next time you look through your camera and are about to push the shutter, stop! Yes, stop and take a reality good, long look.

Examine your subject. Is there a tree growing out of Aunt Sylvia's head?

Have you placed her in a dynamically strong part of the frame? Look at all four corners of the viwlinder. Is there something there, perhaps distracting, that doesn't belong?

Good composition begins with a solid look through the camera and a deter-mination of what you, the photogra-pher, want to record on the film in the most effective way.

LISTED BELOW are some basic guidelines to help you plan and obtain good composition:

Vertical vs. horizontal — Most cameras produce a rectangular negative and a resulting rectangular print. Always fit the picture to your subject. Always fit the picture to your subject composition should be used. Horizons go sideways, so a horizontal format would be appropriate.

Subject placement — Avoid placing the main subject smack in the mide of the picture. As you are looking through the 'viewfinder, imagine two horizontal intens and two vertical lines splitting the frame into nine equal parts. • Subject placement — Avoid placing the main subject smack in the middle of the picture. As you are looking through the 'viewfinder, imagine two horizontal lines and two vertical lines spitting the frame into fine equal parts. You'll notice that these imaginary lines, if real, would intersect at four points.

Placing your main subject near one of these intersecting points adds interest and a dynamic quality to your picture.

Select the best camera position — Take a moment and study your subject to decide the best angle to shoot from.
 A low angle provides an uncluttered sky background when shooting out-

ly direct attention into the picture. In essence, composition is the selection and arrangement of objects in your camera's viewfinder. Taking thatextra long look and thinking about good composition will give your photographs more excitement and certainly more.

One unforgetable afternoon, I felt an uncontrollable urgency building within me. So I took Daddy on a three-hour car ride.

I drove to all the places I remembered him taking me as a child, Belle Isle, Lake Shore Drive. I still

see him watching the sailboats festooning the lake. We completed the tour at RenCen, which Daddy had never seen. Since I wanted him to experience the magnificence of the Plaza Hotel lobby, I drove onto the sidewalk to enable him a better views. I would have found a way to package the world to give him on a sterling platter if Daddy wanted.

WEEKS LATER, I escorted my parents to an airplane seat as they began their journey in a last attempt to find doctors to save Daddy's dwindling life. Placing his hands on my shoulders, Daddy

hugged me tightly.
