I am particularly thrilled to realize that the same group of youth have initiated such a world hunger drive for three successive years, each time raising more money.



Year after year they are enthusiastic about work camps, giving their efforts and their money and they are willing to risk new and difficult relationships for the purpose of helping others.

## Seminar will aid diabetic youths

An all-day seminar designed to help young diabetics work out individual lifestyles will run 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, May 3 in Brighton High School.

Sponsored by the American Diabetes Association, it will be the second such seminar given in the state. Young people over 10 and their parents are invited to participate.

"Diabetics who are 10 to 18 are really pretty much on their own," said Robin Delp, who helped design the seminar. She added that is especially true for girls who are going through hormonal changes.

"It's very hard to generalize when there are so many variables in just growing up," she said, "and it is very important for these young people to be attuned on a pretty regular basis.

Talks with doctors and nurse, films, workshops, exercises and rap sessions all are part of the day to be called "Juvenile Diabetes — Let's Talk about it."

Lunch is included in the fee of \$4 for the first registrant in a family. Additional family members may attend for \$2.

"TALKING about it is probably the most valuable thing we can do," Ms. Delp said. "Talking with those who have gone through or are going through the same thing you are is the best support a diabetic can have. If the parents understand this, so much the batter."

The young woman who is now director of youth education and activities for the American Diabetes Association-Michigan Affiliate was diagnosed as a diabetic when she was 11 years old.
