SEMTA ponders another fare hike for bus, rail

The Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) is proposing another round of bus and commuter rail fare increases, which if approved would be the second in less than a year. The 15-member SEMTA Board of Directors Tuesday authorized that a public hearing be held on the fare increases. The hearing will likely be held by the end of April. If approved by the board, the fare increases would likely take effect July 1.

PROPOSED IS a 5 cents increase in the SEMTA base fare to 60 cents; a

nickel increase in zone charges to 20 cents per zone traveled; a nickel increase in youth (under 18) fare to 40 cents and reductions in the discounts offered SEMTACARD users and purchasers of 10 cents fare weak increased of cents to 55 cents.

The average SEATA bus rider travels up to 14 miles at this, said SEMTA General Manager Larry Salci.

Assuming an average rider travels through four zones, the proposed increases would raise the one-way fare from \$1.15 to \$1.40.

"You'll find that's just about the highest in the country any place," Salci

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THE FARE hikes are being proposed to coincide with the seven-county transportation authority's new fiscal year, which will begin July year, which will begin July year.

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SEMTA Board Chairman Edward McMamara, Livonia mayor, and Oak-inald County representative Henry Hogan, Homer Case and R.J. Alexander voted not to exclude the two groups. Senior citizens receive a half-fare discount when they ride SEMTA buses during "off-peak" hours.

SEMTA'S PROPOSED fiscal 1981 budget of \$92,995,600 is \$12.1 million higher than the current fiscal year's. Fare revenues are expected to provide \$7.1 million for SEMTA's operations. Revenue from state taxes provides

\$43 million of SEMTA's proposed budg-et. Federal funds will provide \$37.3 million.

According to Salci, the transporta-tion system's costs are up due to infla-tion and increased services.

"The system is always going to have be subsidized by taxes," he said. People using the system will have to ear at least a proportion of the cost."

Current bus fares provide slightly more than 20 percent of operating funds, according to SEMTA. The proceed fares would interease the proportion to 25 percent.

Pares for the Pontiac to Detroit commuter rail now provide 20.5 percent of operating costs. The new fares, including 20 cents for each zone traveled, is expected to provide up to 28 percent of operating funds.


