Seniors back moratorium in condominium conversions

A growing number of elderly apart-ment dwellers in Southfield are calling for a moratorium on conversion of rent-

Senior citizens, who fear they'll be driven from their apartments by con-dominium conversions they can't af-ford, packed the Southfield Parks and Recreation Building last Wenesday to hear about legislation proposed to pro-tect tenants.

At Wednesday's public hearing of the Committee on Towns and Counties, many older renters on fixed incomes said nothing will help them except a three-year half on conversions. That measure would allow them time, in the hope the conversion trend will diminish or that some action will be taken to prevent tenants from being turned out, according to a number of seniors.

Another measure introduced by Bennett requires that elderly tenants be given lifetime leases in any apartment project converted to condominiums.

IT WOULD take three years for an owner of rental apartments to win state approval to convert them to con-

condominiums to cover expenses of the lifetime lease program.

"MOST RETIRED people say they can't afford to buy their units and they don't want to move," Ross said. "They want to stay where they are and pay reasonable rents. We expect legislation to pass quickly. Condo convers' have shown they're willing to deal with they roblem and are sensitive to it." Among those who testilied before the committee Wednesday was Mrs. Max Osnos who said a moritorium would allow time to investigate condominium conversions in Michigan. About 48 per-

cent of rental units in the state are tied up in conversions or applications to convert, she said.

"There'll be a dearth of apartments. That means that older parents must live with their parents, and young persons must shack up together.

"Is the state going to provide psychological care for abused children and parents when we have no place to go? Is it fair for developers to enslave us while they reap the benefits? This country should be free for 'young old, middle

aged, poor and everybody else," Mrs. repealed. In the meantime, I could sleep nights."

Attorney Ralph Goldsmith said he doesn't believe a moritorium is unconstitutional and "It's our only hope and salvation. The city can't declare a moritorium his the salvation. itorium, but the state can," he said.

"Legislative bills get amended," he said. "These measures aren't passed over night. It took me two years to de-cide to sell my house and move into an apartment.

"We need at least a three-year hold-ing action on conversions. If a good bill is passed, the moritorium can be

repealed. In the meantime, I could sleep nights."
Retired State Sen. Joseph Snyder, a St. Clair Shores Democrat, agreed that a moritorium would give renters breathing time. Apartments for senior citizens are alternatives to institutions
