

# Y opens doors of new facility to the public

The Farmington Area YMCA, which opened its new \$2.8 million facility this morning at 8 a.m., is sponsoring a host of classes which begin the week of April 28.

"I'd like to stress that classes are open to the community," said Gary Unruh, executive director.

"They helped us build it — over 1,200 persons contributed — we owe it to them to make sure they use it."

Special interest classes include:

## obituaries

MILTON L. SOROCK

Dr. Sorock, 69, of Farmington Hills died April 9.

He was a general surgeon who retired 10 years ago due to illness. Dr. Sorock graduated in 1936 from Wayne State University College of Medicine. He was a major in the Army Medical Corps during World War II and was commanding officer for the 57th Portable Surgical Hospital in the Pacific Theater. He was chief of the surgery division at Sinai Hospital of Detroit from 1953 until 1970. Dr. Sorock was clinical assistant professor of surgery at Wayne State University College of Medicine from 1963 to 1970. He was a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and a founding member and past president of the Detroit Surgical Association. He was a diplomate of the American Board of Surgery and a

member of the Detroit Gastroenterological Society.

In 1960, he received the Presidential Award from the Michigan State Medical Society for distinguished medical service. In 1963, he received the first prize award from the Michigan Hospital Association "For New Hospital Achievements." Dr. Sorock was a member of the Franklin Hills Country Club.

Survivors include: wife, Elaine; son, Robert of Bloomfield; daughters, Mrs. Sallyjo Levine of West Bloomfield, Calif. of Farmington Hills, sister, Mrs. Dorothy Stein of Lake Worth, Fla., Mrs. Bernice Ross of New York and four grandchildren.

Services were April 11 at the Ira Kaufman Chapel, Southfield. Burial was in Clover Hill Park Cemetery, Birmingham.
