And the well-known presidential hopeful — he says this is his third 'offi-cal' try for the White House — distrib-utes his own campaign flyers, which are kept neatly bundled in his attache case.

THE REPUBLICAN nomination in not locked up. Stassen insists. "There are very few delegates who are legally committed."

Stassen maintains he can win the GOP pomination, even though as of last week he had no delegates officially. "When I started, I recognized I was number 11 of 11 (GOP candidates), said the former director of foreign operations in the Eisenhower Administration.

As he approached Tuesday's Pennsylvania primary, Stassen noted he had "gradually" climbed to fourth. "One of my main problems now," he said, "is to break through on to national TV."

The terru's "perennial" has stuck with candidate Stassen. He says former President Lyndon Johnson first used the term to describe him when Stassen entered the 1988 presidential race based on his opposition to the war in Vietnam.

STASSEN IS on the May 20 primary ballot in Michigan but wouldn't specu-late on how he'll do.

One of the three original drafters and signers of the United Nations chirer, Stassen was most critical of Presi-dent Jimmy Carter's foreign policy. Carter, said Stassen, is manipulating foreign affairs "for the sake of the do-mestic spollight." He said Carter's 'turning the screw on Iran for continuing to hold Ameri-

He said Carter's "turning the screws" on Iran for continuing to hold American hostiges would be "counter-productive." He rapped Carter for not sending a "skilled, experienced" U.S. representative to negotiate the hostages release. Stassen said Carter immediately should have sought a declaration of war from Congress, which would have allowed associates of the Iranian government living in the U.S. to be placed under custody.

That kind of counter-move would have long ago got us out of there," he said.

STASSEN DISAGREES with the U.S. boycott of the Moscow Olympic Games as a response to the Soviet Union's late December invasion of Afghanistan.

"To interpret that our participation (in Moscow) is support of the Soviet Un-ion's policies is ridiculous," said Stas-

sen.

In 1955, Stassen led the American delegation at the Geneva summit meeting with the Soviets. The talks were the first on nuclear disarmament and led to cultural exchanges between the two countries.

Those exchanges, said Stassen, "continued until this latest flap.
"Our athletes and tourists should be there (at the Olympics)," he said.
Stassen said the U.S. and USSR are in "intense competition of what might be called the free system versus the communist system.

"It's a competition, not a cold war, not a hot war. You do not want it to escalate to a war.

"You have to work on a basis (in negotiating conflicts) that you do not trust, but work on mutual actions."

ON DOMESTIC issues, Stassen pro-poses to stop the country's double digit inflation with "full employment," is op-posed to a peacetime draft and sees nu-clear power as necessary until other renewable forms of energy are devel-

"We have to put restrictions on the abuse of credit," Stassen said, "but not go for tight money and high interest," which he says, "handicaps necessary expansion of productive capacity."

The federal government should enter into "multi-billion dollar contracts through major corporations," said Stassen, and give the coporations "objectives."



One objective would be the "use of all unemployed youth in integrated worthwhile efforts," said Stassen.

But Stassen admits he has helped the former California Gov. Reagan in one


